She says: "Dear Heloise: Knowing that many

for aces. If partner bids five diamonds, indicating one ace, you will of course pass. If partner responds five hearts, showing two aces, you will bid six diamonds. If he responds five spades, showing three aces, you will next bid five notrump, asking for kings. If partner responds six diamonds, indicating one king (which must be the king of clubs), you will bid seven diamonds because you can count 13 tricks. Finally, if partner bids six clubs (no kings), you should stop in six diamonds as you cannot account for what you will do with your spade loser.

2. Four clubs. If you had a minimum opening bid, you'd normally bid three notrump or four diamonds to show your limited resources. But this hand is not a minimum - you have 17 high-card points - and you can portray these extra values by bidding four clubs to show interest in a slam and first-round control of clubs. You then leave the rest to partner. He may go on to a slam or choose to stop at game as he sees fit. 3. Three notrump. This is not a pleasant bid to

make, considering your spade holding, but there is no better call available. In view of your flat distribution, an 11-trick game in diamonds is far less attractive than a nine-trick notrump game.
