Delving into family histories reveals treasures at museum

We always strive to make the Prairie Museum of Art and History a place where visitors can discover new information about familiar history as well as topics about which they may know very little. Several current projects have served to remind us how much this is true for staff members as well.

One of these projects is getting ready for the upcoming year's programs and displays on the settlement era of the late 1800s. Next year, 2012, marks the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Homestead Act in 1862. That same year saw landmark legislation creating a crosscountry railroad, the system of land-grant colleges and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Each of these acts had an impact on the pattern of settlement in northwest Kansas, and we will be exploring those over the next couple of years.

The discovery part has been delving into the boxes of Thomas County family histories in the vault and finding information and personal accounts we didn't even know we had. Several original Homestead and Timber Claim documents are housed there, along with some very detailed letters, a couple of diaries and other primary documents that will help us more fully tell the story of that time.

It is easy to get lost in the past, reading these fascinating accounts. Reminding us of how precious paper was at that time, it is not uncommon to run across letters with handwriting running down the page and along the margins, front and back, in an attempt to use every bit of space available. One innovative letter-writer wrote down the page vertically, then flipped it



and wrote across it horizontally.

Another project we are completing is a settlement-era trunk and packet of activities for use by teachers, and much of our research is going toward that effort.

Meanwhile, in the Kuska collection, we continue to revise information about the pieces on exhibit. Sometimes knowledgeable visitors help with identification of items about which we are unsure, and on other occasions the answer is found with the help of expertise available through the Internet.

We recently opened the Meissen cases so that Chris could photograph the maker's marks and other details on these ceramics. She submitted the photographs to experts in Meissen, Germany, who were helpful in clarifying dates and other information, including which items are Meissen and which are Meissen-type. We will be updating our labels in those cases to reflect what we have learned.

We are currently displaying Thresia Aschenbrenner's lovely quilts through Tuesday, Sept. 6. We had a bit of a schedule mix-up, so our fall exhibits are different from what you may have read. In September and October, we will have art by the Colby Community College Art Department, Bonnie Stasser will be showing her mixed media artwork in November and

December. The Art Club will be exhibiting next March and April.
