Need we depend on the law?

In 1952, William O. Douglas, the longest serving justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, famously stated, "We are a religious people whose institutions presuppose a Supreme Being." There is no institution where the belief in a supreme being is more obvious and vital than our criminal justice system. Harvard law professor Alan Dershowitz explains the connection:

"Western society has insisted that it is better for ten guilty defendants to go free than for one innocent defendant to be wrongly convicted. This daunting standard finds its roots in the biblical story of Abraham's argument with God about the sinners of Sodom.... Abraham admonishes God for planning to sweep away the innocent along with the guilty and asks Him whether it would be right to condemn the sinners of Sodom if there were 10 or more righteous people among them. God agrees and reassures Abraham that he would spare the city if there were 10 righteous. From this compelling account, the legal standard has emerged.

"That is why a criminal trial is not a search for truth. Scientists search for truth. Philosophers search for morality. A criminal trial searches for only one result: proof beyond a reasonable doubt."

Alan Dershowitz is an atheist. Yet he understands and correctly states the biblical foundation for this basic principle of our criminal system of justice. But what Dershowitz does not explain is how a society can live with letting so many criminals go free.

The Bible is a very realistic book. It teaches us that the world is broken. Because of this, because we live in a sin-cursed world, chaotic evils such as that which took the life of little Calee Anthony occur. Sadly, all around the world today, children just as innocent as Calee Anthony, will become victims of the evil that still marinates this broken world. But that does not mean there will be no justice for them. Jesus explained it this way:

"Woe to the world because of its stumbling

through whom the stumbling block comes! If your hand or your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off and throw it from you; it is better for you to enter life crippled or lame, than to have two hands or two feet and be cast into the eternal fire. If your eye causes you to stumble, pluck it out.... It is better for you to enter life with one eye, than to have two eyes and be cast into the fiery hell. See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to vou that their angels in heaven continually see the face of My Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 18:7-10. New American Standard).

Jesus' statement that "it is inevitable that stumbling blocks come," is worth pondering. But so also is his statement about despising 'little ones," which is a reference to little children like Calee Anthony. As are his warnings that it would be better to mutilate ourselves than to put a stumbling block in front of them.

These sorts of assurances used to be enough to allow us to bear up under the inevitable imperfection of a criminal justice system weighed in favor of the accused. But as our society increasingly loses it faith we see a frightening phenomena - men and women angrily demanding infallible justice of a fallible justice system.

This leads me to yet another point worth pondering. If William O. Douglas was correct in saying that our institutions presuppose a supreme being, can institutions survive if we stop believing in a supreme being?
