Chiefs back to work after preseason loss

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. – Give credit to Chiefs coach Todd Haley: He's sticking with his plan.

It was hard to give anybody else in camp much credit after Friday night.

"You have to, as a head coach, look at the big picture all the time," Haley said in a measured tone. "It's a different set of circumstances, and the goal is to be ready for Sept. 11, and that's all that I'm focused on.' That's when the defending AFC West champions open the regular season against the Buffalo Bills, and it's creeping up quickly. The NFL lockout resulted in a condensed offseason and a frenetic start to training camp, and there are only three more exhibitions during which the Chiefs can prepare for games that count. "I feel really good about our plan," Haley maintained, when asked Sunday whether he regretted the almost overly cautious approach the Chiefs have taken through two weeks of camp. By design, the Chiefs didn't play wide receiver Steve Breaston, defensive tackle Kelly Gregg, fullback Le'Ron McClain and several other free agent acquisitions.

Veteran center Casey Wiegmann got the night off, as did banged-up defensive end Glenn Dorsey and outside linebacker Tamba Hali, who spent his first game at Arrowhead Stadium since signing a fiveyear, \$60 million contract doing little more than wandering up and down the sideline.

TOPEKA - As the state con- pating in outdoor activities." tinues to experience record-high temperatures, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment wants to encourage state school administrators, activity directors and coaches to be extremely cautious and monitor the health of their students.

The department recently contacted the Kansas State High School Activities Association to stress the importance of staying safe during hot weather, not just during excessive heat warnings.

"No one wants harm to come to our children, but sometimes we may overlook the warning signs," said Tom Langer, Director of Bureau of Environmental Health. 'We are especially concerned that even as the temperatures decline out of triple-digit readings that the combination of temperature, relative humidity and exposure to the sun's rays can negatively affect everyone's health, especially student athletes and anyone partici-

Heat is the number one weather-related killer in the United States and heat illness is the leading cause of preventable death in high school athletics. Other states have already seen student athletes die due to heat exhaustion. Before sending your child or player outside, keep these safety tips in mind:

· Make sure students drink fluids (water or sports drink) at least 30 minutes before the activity begins and every 15-20 minutes during activity.

Have them wear light-colored, breathable clothing.

· Know the symptoms of heatrelated illnesses, like heat rash, sunburns, heat cramps and heat exhaustion. More info at www.kdheks.gov/beh/extreme_heat.htm.
