Nex-Tech Mobile Radio Supervisor Ryan McClung urges PLMR operators to act soon, as the narrowbanding licensing process can be time consuming.

"The required FCC paperwork can take anywhere from six to nine months to process. Since everyone is required to make this change, the FCC's approval process continues to lengthen," he said.

Military veterans can gain key certifications for small businesses

In addition, veterans can obtain assistance in verifying their Veteran-Owned Small Business (VOSB) and SD-VOSB status with the Center for Veterans Enterprise (CVE).

The process of applying for the SD-VOSB designation is tedious and often leaves veterans frustrated and in need of assistance to finish the process. KSBDC has teamed up with Karl Monger, owner of DriPowder LLC, a designated Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business, and the founder of GallantFew Inc., an organization dedicated to assisting veterans in transition.

"In 2009, I was laid off from my job. In researching opportunities, I was stunned that President Bush in 2004 signed Executive Order 13360, mandating every federal agency set aside 3 percent of its procurement budget for SDVOSB's," said Monger.

Military veterans now have a service VA's Certified Veteran Enterprise desig- the SDVOSB process, veteran business officers turn to the VA CVE list to identify valid SDVOSBs. Three percent of the federal procurement budget in 2009 represented more than \$18 billion, yet less than half of that mandated amount went to SDVOSBs. This represents an incredible opportunity for veteran business owners.

Funding for KSBDC veteran services are provided by a grant from the US Small Business Administration. The grant does not restrict counseling to Kansas veterans. KSBDC provides the special veteran counseling services to veterans from any state in the United States. In addition, if a veteran initially receives assistance in Kansas but relocates to another state, counseling can continue through the KS-BDC or with a local Small Business Development Center in their new location.
