

Hear, hear! Elephant ears

Dear Heloise: Several years ago, you printed a recipe for HELOISE'S ELEPHANT EARS in our paper, The Bakersfield Californian, using refrigerated biscuits. This was such a hit at our family reunion! However, I have lost the recipe and would appreciate it if you would print it again. — Jan B., Bakersfield, Calif.

This is a favorite reader and family recipe, and one that is easy to make, plus absolutely delicious! You will need:
 1/2 cup cinnamon
 1 cup white sugar
 1 can cinnamon buns (found in the dairy case)
 First, preheat your oven to 375 F. Mix the cinnamon and sugar together and pour it into a 9-by-13-inch cake pan (to keep it contained, because it can make a big mess). Take one bun and put it into the cake pan, and use a rolling pin to roll each bun. Turn often so the dough absorbs lots of the sugar and cinnamon. Place the coated buns on a FOIL-LINED cookie sheet, and put it into the oven. Bake on the center rack. Check often so they don't burn or overbake (which they can do since they are very thin). Enjoy! — Heloise

BREAD HINT
 Dear Heloise: When there is a heat wave, baking seems less appealing. Instead of baking breads (in loaves) such as banana bread, which takes an hour to bake, I make muffins from the same recipe because they take about one-third of the time in the oven. They are convenient, fast and still delicious. — Margarette M., Temple, Texas

FRESH HERBS
 Dear Heloise: I use fresh herbs in cooking and salads, especially chives, but often don't use them before they go bad. Now I wash, cut to size, lay out on a layer of paper towels and cover with another layer until they are completely moisture-free. When dry, store them in plastic containers in the freezer. They don't stick together, and it is easy to spoon out the amount needed. — M. Hill, San Clemente, Calif.

 Dear Heloise: Having seen in your column a reference regarding the three-fold, clear plastic egg containers, I thought I would let you know what I did with them.

Try the Impossible
 This deal, played many years ago in a tournament, provides an excellent example of proper squeeze technique. South reached four hearts as shown. Three notrump would have been much easier — nine tricks were available off the top. It appears declarer must lose four tricks -- two clubs, a spade and a diamond — but South found the solution. West started with the K-A-J of clubs, East playing the queen on the third round. South recognized that his only chance was to engineer a squeeze. Since squeezes seldom operate unless declarer has only one loser remaining, South discarded a spade on the queen of clubs. East shifted to a spade, taken by declarer with the ace. South then cashed the A-Q of hearts and A-K of diamonds before playing two more trumps to reach this position:
North
 ♠ K 7
 ♣ 9
West
 ♠ Q 10
 ♣ 10
East
 ♠ J 9
 ♦ Q
South
 ♠ 5
 ♥ 10
 ♦ 10

When declarer cashed the ten of hearts, the defenders were caught in a double squeeze. West could not spare the ten of clubs, so he had to discard a spade. The club nine, having served its purpose, was discarded from dummy, and East now felt the pinch. He couldn't afford to let the diamond queen go, so he also pitched a spade. South then scored the last two tricks with dummy's K-7 of spades, and the contract was home.
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
