Best time to plant trees is now

Gardening instincts are to plant in the spring, but fall is often the best time to plant trees.

The months of September through mid-December have distinct advantages. Fall planting follows the heat of summer, and precedes a cool winter season. Trees and shrubs planted use this to good advantage. Plant roots grow anytime the soil temperature is 40 degrees or higher.

Fall planting does have some limitations. Bare root plants should only be planted in late winter or early spring while the plants are still dormant. Evergreens should be planted earlier in the fall, no later than the end of October as the permanent foliage increases water needs and watering ability may be limited.

Fall-planted trees require frequent watering. Initially, once a week is recommended when we don't get rain and after a couple of months watering frequency can be reduced to twice a month. During periods when the soil is frozen watering isn't needed. Watering shouldn't be a limiting factor in most landscapes using hoses. In large plantings with irrigation systems, this could be a concern depending on what type of



pipe is used, how easy it is to drain the line, etc. However, with a little effort it is even possible to use most drip systems during the winter with little chance of damage.

Freezing and thawing of the soil can cause some problems the first winter with fall-planted trees. It may open up air pockets that dry out the roots, or in some cases it can even push the root ball to the surface. These problems can be minimized by placing a 2 to 4 inch layer of mulch around the trees at planting time.

Fertilizing any trees in the fall, especially newly planted ones is not recommended. Save your fertilizer for late winter or spring. Fall fertilizing may encourage excessive growth that newly planted trees can't support. Freeze farmers and ranchers.

Tree nuts can also be planted in the fall. This is an excellent way to establish trees like bur oak and walnut. Simply collect the nuts and plant them one to three inches deep. With black walnuts, leave the husk on. With oak acorns, soak the seed in water for 12 to 24 hours then drain and store in a cool, dark place until planting. Make sure they're stored in a container that breathes - not plastic bags or buckets. Germination won't be 100 percent, so plant two or three nuts near each other where you want a tree. Then simply remove the weaker extra trees that might emerge or transplant to another spot where you want a tree.

Foundation accepting scholarship applications

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation will make 275 scholarships available in five categories to students in 26 Northwest Kansas counties for the 2011-2012 academic year. Residents of Cheyenne, Decatur, Logan, Norton, Rawlins, Sheridan, Sherman, Thomas and Wallace counties, among others in northwest Kansas, are eligible.

The Hansen Vocational Education Scholarship has been renamed the Hansen Career and Technical Education Scholarship. There are 100 career and technical education scholarships available. These \$2,000 nonrenewable awards are available to encourage high school seniors who seek competence through career training. Applicants must complete an application form available from high school counselors. The scholarship committee is interested in the student's character, activities and goals. Applicants are not required to take a qualifying test, nor is there a minimum grade average to apply for this scholarship. Recipients may enroll in any career and technical education program, in any Kansas school, as long as it is not leading to a four-year degree.

In addition to the scholarships offered to high school seniors, the foundation will also award 15 community college scholarships of \$2,000. These scholarships are available for Kansas community college students who have com-

pleted 32 hours of college credit by spring and are transferring to an accredited four-year public, private or church related Kansas college or university. Each may be renewed for one year. Applications are available at the office of the college's dean of student services or at www.hansenfoundationscholarships.com.

Scholarships available for students who will graduate this year also include the Leaders of Tomorrow, the Hansen Scholar and the Hansen Student scholarships. In varying amounts these renewable awards have minimum grade average requirements along with a minimum qualifying ACT test score. Registration materials and testing information has been provided to all schools.

Through scholarships the Trustees of the Dane G. Hansen Foundation encourage good citizenship and high achievement in academic endeavors. Improvement of educational opportunities for students in Western Kansas ranks high among the objectives of the Trustees of the Hansen Foundation.




