

Time to start in on your leaf collection

Alright, here's what I want you

Next time you go to the store, buy a box of those 10-gallon black plastic trash bags. You know, the ones with the red, blue, or yellow drawstrings you see in the picture on the box. Try your best to avoid those bags with no drawstrings, even though they're a little cheaper, because you're going to need drawstrings for this project.

When you get home, find your rake, and go out and rake your leaves. If your leaves are just lying there on your lawn, put the bag on the mower and pick up the leaves in that manner, being careful not to pick up locust bean pods, small tree limbs, and children's toys. When the mower bag is filled, empty the contents into one of those 10 gallon trash bags vou just bought. Fill as many bags as you possibly can, and then offer to pick up the leaves in your neighbor's yard and fill a few more bags. Store those bags of leaves in the garden shed, garage, or barn, or just stack them out by the back fence.

Then go to the phone and call the guy who takes care of lawns for some of the town's residents and ask him if he would mind hauling his next load of leaves over to your house and dump them on your garden plot. Tell that if he'll do that, it might be worth a cantaloupe to him next summer. First chance you get, scatter that load of leaves evenly over the garden and plow them under, as deeply as you can. Or call the kid down the street who owns a rototiller and have him do the job for you.

Wow! You have your garden put to bed for the winter, plus you have 10 or 12 bags of nice clean leaves stored away to use for mulching next spring's crop of potatoes, cu-

The Gardener cumbers and tomatoes. Actually,

you're way ahead of most of us who may still be waiting for the leaves to fall. The timing of the above procedure can vary from 10 to 20 days and still achieve the same result. But do it. If not next week,

then anytime before the ground freezes, which which is generally sometime between Dec. 10 and 20 in our area. Plowing under leaves in your garden in the fall does so much to add to the texture of the soil in which you will entrust your seeds next spring. You'll be amazed at the new workability. It doesn't have to be leaves - any kind of material such as straw, old hay, or dry manure plowed into your garden this fall will biodegrade during the winter months due to the freezing and thawing The job needs to be done just

as soon as you can clear your plot of the old tomato vines, the corn stalks and the expired squash vines. Burn the old tomato vines. or haul them to the landfill. But run the mower over the rest of the material including the cornstalks. and then plow it under when you

Everyone's garden soil must be regenerated annually in order for us to realize a bumper crop next season. Look ahead a little. Locate some leaves now. Or when they magically appear in yards everywhere. They're free. They're plentiful. But they need your help to put them in their proper place.
