Museum holds session for Colby High juniors

We had a great time with the Colby High School juniors a couple of weeks ago. They have been studying westward expansion and immigration, and we designed a two-hour session here at the museum in which they could explore that period as it played

Prior to their visit, each of the students was assigned one of 18 identities of actual Thomas County settlers. Among these settlers were Civil War veterans, women and immigrants from other countries. We provided information about each person's claim location, where they came from, when they came here, family members, what they brought with them, copies of homestead patents, naturalization papers and other documents if available, and an account of their experience in northwest Kansas.

The class was broken down into five groups and, with the help of Mark Berry and David Pabst, we arranged for 20-minute sessions on five topics.

Mark did a great job acquainting the students with the topic of settler-era patent medicines and food preservation. David brought out his chuck wagon, made a campfire and cooked beans and a cobbler for the students while discussing his own experience traveling the Western Cattle Trail.

Sue explained the township and range survey system and helped the students locate their claim on a Thomas County "map" Larry had laid out on the grass – thanks to the American Youth Soccer Organization for the use of their field striper!

Chris talked about immigration and had the students try to answer questions that candidates for U.S. citizenship might be asked today; and I photographed the students at the sod house as they reenacted scenes from the lives of Thomas County settlers.

There is something about learning by doing that helps impress an idea more readily into the memory. Most of the activities of this day were designed with that in mind, and the success of this approach appears to be borne out in comments like this from one of the Museum of Art and History.
