Revnolds said he'd been told that the changes would not affect departure times for mail trucks leaving Colby and delivery times at homes and businesses would also be unaffected.

Moving Colby's mail would save about \$14,000 after transportation costs are factored in. Reynolds said the number is comparatively low because Colby's processing – and much of the equipment used to do it – has already been moved out.

Express mail from within the 677 zip codes should remain a same-day service, he said. Priority packages that are too large to fit in mail sacks will be handled manually in Colby, just like they are now. Newspapers that are sorted down to the five-digit zip codes will go out with that day's mail as long as it is brought in by 4 to 5 a.m. Newspapers that are addressed with the first zip

sent to Denver to be sorted into delivery order.

Reynolds said that although the study supports moving Colby's processing to Denver, the service hasn't made a decision yet. eliminated. He said in the past he hasn't known about changes until the day they are made, and he has had trouble getting hold of anyone who can give him correct information. Reynolds asked the contractor to give him contact information after the meeting and said that he knew of one truck route between Colby and McCook that would be lost if the service goes ahead with the plan.

The contractor also took issue with Reynolds' claim that no postal employees had been laid off, saying that his uncle, who had driven mail trucks for 42 years was laid off not long ago. Reynolds had said earlier in the meeting that the service had gone from 880,000 employees to 559,000 entirely through attrition and voluntary early retirements. Independent contractors, he said, were not part of those figures.

When asked how much money these Area Mail Processing studies cost, Reynolds said the calculations of time, distance, maintenance and money saved are done in-house by an employee who is working full time anyway, so that part does not cost extra. The studies also include the public comments from the meetings, he said.

Revnolds said the service does sometimes hire outside firms to audit its business.

ters. Reynolds replied that it hadn't, but the service's economists expect to lose another 39 billion pieces of mail and some of that would likely come from people who choose not to utilize the post office.

Fry suggested that since the federal government is intent on creating jobs, why doesn't the post office go back to hand-sorting so it can hire on more people and have better service. He also suggested the service

"People don't mind paying for a good service," he said.

Colby Free Press Publisher Sharon Friedlander said the Postal Service is forcing newspapers out of the system, which in turn is not good for the service.

When asked if any of these studies had resulted in a processing center not being

moved, Reynolds said the center in North Platte, Neb., was not moved after a study found that consolidating it with Cheyenne, Wyo., would not save any money. "Not every one of these studies is a slam

dunk," he said.
