Thomas County Health Department, new treatment The 12-dose regimen is a combination regimen of isoniazid and rifapentine given in 12 once-weekly doses. The previous therapy, by contrast, required nine months of daily medication. Reducing both the amount of medication and the time required for treatment increase the likelihood that treatment will be completed, according to Ryan, who pointed out that completing the full course of treatment is necessary for it to be effective.

The Department of Health is currently developing state policies for the use of the new regimen. A current shortage of one of the medications is expected to slow efforts to implement the program.

"Treating TB infection to prevent progression to TB disease is a cornerstone of the Kansas strategy for TB elimination," explained Phil Griffin, Director of TB Control and Prevention. "It's important that vancement in preventing future cases of tuberculosis those infected receive adequate care."
