





Hints from Heloise

Plastic provides perfect packing

Dear Heloise: First, let me say I love your column and read it every day. When I read your article on travel advice from Joan Crawford, one of my favorites, I was especially interested.

Here is my take on PERFECT PACKING: I keep plastic bags from the dry cleaners in my suitcases and use them for each individual suit, blouse or dress on hangers. I then fold them, in their plastic bag and on a hanger, and put them in the suitcase.

When I arrive at my destination, I unpack each item and hang it up. As I use the items, I place the plastic bag with the hanger back in my suitcase, and put worn or soiled clothes on top.

When packing pressed items not on hangers, I just place a plastic bag between each fold. My clothes are always wrinkle-free.

In my overnight bag, I keep a laminated 5-by-7-inch index card of items never to forget, such as medications, travel umbrella, tennis shoes and socks, nightgown, etc. On the other side of the same card, I list toiletries, such as soap, lip balm, hair spray, toothpaste, etc. This laminated card lives in my overnight case, and I keep a duplicate in my suitcase. 1. Two spades. Your takeout double has forced partner to bid, so he might have no values at all. The best you can do, therefore, is to make a single

raise, indicating spade support and about 16 to 18 points (with less than that, you would pass one spade). Partner can have anywhere from zero to at most nine points (with a better hand, he would have jumped in spades). You don't have to guess what he has, though; all you need to do is to tell him what you have and let him decide what to

2. One notrump. The choice lies between one notrump and two clubs, both of which show substantial extra values. The notrump bid is slightly better because it is more apt to induce a further bid from partner. He might pass two clubs with a hand where he considers an 11-trick game too remote to be pursued, yet act over one notrump because a nine-trick game would seem within the realm of possibility.

Note that a jump to two notrump would be overly exuberant, as it would indicate the values for an opening two-notrump bid, which you clearly don't have.

3. Three spades. While partner's response is forced, he might still have the few ingredients necessary to produce 10 tricks. For example, he might hold:

J8652 ♥ K763 ♦ 93 ♣ 85, or **♦** K854 ♥ 96 ♦ 82 **♣** J7632,

and with either of them he should happily bid

4. Two clubs. It might seem cowardly to bid only two clubs, but the fact is that game is unlikely unless partner voluntarily bids again.

The alternative bids are two spades or three clubs, but neither of them can be recommended. It would be dangerous to raise spades with only three-card support, as partner might have only four cards in the suit. It would be equally dangerous to leap to three clubs, since if partner has a worthless hand, you are not likely to make nine




