year for at least 20 years or longer, depending on how long the project is operating, but by law we are not obligated to pay anything.

Kennon explained that the turbines need at least 6.7 miles per hour of wind at the hub height of the unit for rotation and they cannot operate when wind speeds reach 46.7 miles per hour. He said that if the entire wind farm is operating at maximum capacity all of the time, that is considered 100 percent operational.

"Findings have concluded that based on the average wind speed in the area, we are estimating 45 percent, which is impressive. A good way of looking at it is that each turbine is expected to generate about 1.5 megawatts of energy which is equal to powering about 700 homes," said Kennon. "However, we have to remember that there is not always a demand for energy and sometimes we have the energy, but don't have anywhere to send it."

In addition to the information presented, several questions were raised by concerned farmers and property owners.

"There won't be any turbines on my property, but they will be close enough that I'm concerned they'll conflict with aerial spray-ing since there will be a lot of no fly zones," said Steve Friesen.

Another spectator raised concern about the standard depth for underground ball bearings and cables, which is 36 inches.

During the beginning part of the meeting, Kennon said they have been in contact with local emergency services and the Colby Municipal Airport and have taken advisement from their recommendations and concerns.

He said although the majority of plans are in place to assist with the initial build,, minor changes, including the dig depth, can always be made if necessary. In addition, Acciona's development representative John Rhoades who has experience with wind farms in rural parts of Oklahoma said there shouldn't be too much concern.

"In the United States, there are about 42,000 megawatts of power generated from turbines and many are near fields," said Dorr. "I've actually talked to two local sprayers and one professional with over 20 years of flying experience who has actually flown near wind farms. They all said there shouldn't be any problems. The professional guy said he can get as close as they do to power lines and I've seen them get within feet of those."

"It may pose to be more challenging," added Kennon, "but shouldn't preclude them from flying."

The concern of burdening the landfill was also mentioned, since there are always wor- southern horizon line of Colby. ries about daily tonnage.

Kennon said the majority of the packaging is recycled within the company, so a lot of the spools and specialty packages will not be left behind. However, smaller items will be brought in on pallets, which cannot be burned.

It was requested that the company look into recycling those items to alleviate some of the burden on the landfill. They will also be charged regular prices for waste that ends up in the landfill.

The company explained that as tenants to the property owner, they will only have access to the turbines from a road which will be protected by a locked gate.

"The path that is used to get to the turbine from the main road will not be public," Dorr said. "Although the path will be our property, nobody will have access to the road unless the landowner gives them permission. We will maintain it as long as the project is operational, and then the landowner can decided whether they want to keep it or not. If they decide to keep it, then maintenance becomes their responsibility.'

Not only does the company plan to maintain the paths that are created to get to the turbines, they also plan to restore all main roads used during construction. The only footprint left behind will be the erection of 72 turbines, each 397 feet high, across the
