The Colby High boys basketball varsity was shorthanded Friday, with sophomore Luke Cox missing from the lineup as the Eagles lost to Holcomb 56-23 at the Community Building.

Cox suffered a broken hand last week and had surgery Friday, when doctors put a pin in his hand. Coach Jerad Johnson said he is still not sure when

"There's a possibility of him being back by the Orange and Black Classic," he said, "but we're not sure right now.'

Sophomore Connor Schwanke also was hurt last week when he went down with a knee injury on Tuesday in a junior varsity game against Goodland. He will be out for at least six months, Johnson said, adding that it has been tough losing these two.

The varsity Eagles (1-7) were really missing Cox when it came to getting the ball into play Friday.

Sophomore Marc Bremenkamp took over as the inbounder, and despite his best efforts, he turned the ball over to Holcomb six times, contributing to Colby's total of 20.

Holcomb scored 11 points off of Colby's turnovers and had 24 points from bench players. The Eagles didn't score any in those categories.

Junior Todd Kane led Colby's scoring efforts with 7 points. He pulled down 3 rebounds and made 5 of 6 free throws in the game.

Senior Dalaan Organ, Bremenkamp, senior Braden Sager and sophomore Reed Stephens finished the game with 4 points each. Organ had a team-high 6 rebounds, Bremenkamp had 2 rebounds and 1 steal, Sager grabbed 1 steal and Stephens had 2 rebounds.

The Eagles made 60 percent of their free throws and pulled down 19 rebounds. They didn't make any three-point shots.

The boys will play their next game at Ulysses High School at 8 p.m. Friday. Their next home game will be at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 31, against Scott City.

K-State Wildcats lose 75-73 to No. 4 Baylor

MANHATTAN (AP) would have been easy for Kansas State point guard Will Spradling to appreciate Baylor's athleticism as the Bears stormed down the court for dunks and easy points Tuesday night.

But after the fourth-ranked Bears slipped past the No. 18 Wildcats 75-73 with numerous quick scoring runs, Spradling could only think about his team.

Perry Jones led Baylor (16-0, 3-0 Big 12) with 17 points while Quincy Acy had 13. The pair went a combined 14 of 18 from the floor. Two other Bears scored in double figures: Brady Heslip with 13 and Pierre Jackson with
