The Colby Community College women's basketball team held off the Dodge City Lady Conquistadors for a much-needed win Wednesday at the Community Building. The Lady Trojans got their first conference win with a score of 73-61.

Colby (5-12) was in the lead for the first half and went into the locker room with 28-20 on the scoreboard. The Lady Trojans were up 17 points with 12:40 left in the game when Dodge City made a comeback.

The Lady Conquistadors (8-9) went on a 12-2 run in three minutes, mainly by landing threepoint shots. Jazmin Villa hit 5 out of 5 three-point field goals in the game and Dodge City as a whole finished with 11 three-pointers.

The Lady Trojans got their offense rolling again, however, and scored 25 points in the remaining minutes while holding Dodge City to 20 points.

Sophomore Liga Vente had a game-high 28 points for Colby along with 6 rebounds, 1 block and 1 steal. She was 12 of 22 from the field and made 4 out of 4 free
