

rights that are seldom used. 'It's all real wet stuff," he said.

Of the six areas, Bossert said, only Sheridan County 6, has set targets for reducing water use. The others have proposed targets from the district, he said, but the farmers using water in the areas have been reluctant to set a goal. He said the district board might have to step in and do the goals itself, but that's up to the board.

The districts are Thomas County 5, south-

area northwest of town; Sherman County 1 southwest of Goodland; Sherman County 2 east of Goodland; Chevenne County 3 near St. Francis and Sheridan 6, from Hoxie west to the county line along U.S. 24, including one quarter township in Thomas County.

Bossert said the program could use some more applicants and he worries, with grain prices so high right now, farmers may be reluctant to give up any water.

In Sheridan County, though, the new grant may get the program to the point where

people can actually see a difference. To help with that, he said, some district money will be used to drill more monitoring wells.

The sign-up period is expected to remain open until mid-March, and all money has to be obligated by July 2. The state Water TAP program is expected to have some money available this year for buyouts, but the final amount won't be known until the Legislature sets its budget.

Vacik reiterated that they could discuss the issue further in a closed-door session, but did say that after looking into the matter, he thinks the college is at a point where this is a reasonable outcome.

In other business, the board:

• Approved the Violence Prevention Committee's proposal, presented in November, to improve safety on campus. Before voting, Arlen Leiker, vice chair and treasurer, said his only concern was money. He asked how the college was going to pay for the improvements.

Vacik said the college has money from the Hansen Foundation to use at the president's discretion. The college has been frugal in using it, he said, but some of the money could be used for this project.

Leiker said he was concerned about setting money aside for a reserve fund.
