A. Gene Jones, 83, Colby, known for his prison ministry, died Monday, Feb. 6, 2012, at Citizens Medical Center in Colby.

He was born April 20, 1928, to Alfred and Olga (Barnes) Jones in rural Jewell County. He served in the Army during World War II and the Korean War. On Aug. 26, 1960, he married Frieda Heid in Bismarck N.D., and in 1968 they moved to Colby.

A bricklayer and homebuilder, he was a member of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the College Drive Assembly of God Church.

Preceding him in death were his parents; a brother, Elton Jones; a half-brother, R.C. Dugger; and a grandson, Vance Smith.

Outside the beltway: political tips for the rest of us

WASHINGTON (AP) — A political tip sheet for the rest of us outside the Washington Beltway, Monday, Feb. 6:

LIVE FROM THE SEA OF TRANQUILITY: Newt Gingrich gave "Saturday Night Live" easy fodder when he vowed to put an American colony on the moon by decade's end if he becomes president. A recent skit on the comedy show satirized "Newt Gingrich: Moon President" as it imagined the former House speaker presiding over the moon. Gingrich said Monday in Minnesota that his GOP rivals and late-night comics are off base for mocking his idea, which he described as a way to encourage innovation and scientific discovery.

GLITTER WATCH: Minnesota has gained an odd reputation in the GOP presidential race: It's the state where candidates get glittered. Newt Gingrich got showered in May, then-candidate Michele Bachmann had some fluffing her way the next month and Mitt Romney got hit twice during a single stop this month.

GINGRICH HIRED LOBBYISTS: Republican presidential candidate Newt Gingrich is facing more questions about lobbying. He says his consulting group never lobbied for clients. But his business hired state and federal lobbyists to work with clients, and some staff left to take lobbying jobs, according to lobbying disclosures and corporate reports.

NEGATIVITY SELLS: Get used to negative ads, President Barack Obama says. During an interview with NBC's "Today" show, Obama said the rise of political action committees guarantees that there will be a lot of negative ads in the lead-up to November's presidential election. Obama says he would prefer to get the "big money" out of politics. Obama wouldn't say whether his cam-

paign or outside supporters would avoid negative ads.

SANTORUM'S INDIANA BLUES: Santorum's campaign says it has found enough valid signatures to get him on Indiana's ballot. Santorum, who has shown no signs of quitting despite losses at the polls — four in a row — and in momentum, can't afford to be left out. He's already failed to qualify for Virginia's primary next month. A Santorum spokesman said the campaign found an additional 49 signatures it believes were wrongly deemed invalid by officials in Marion County, Ind. Statewide candidates must collect 500 valid signatures from each of the state's nine congressional districts to be placed on the ballot. The county elections board ruled last week that Santorum fell 24 signatures short in the 7th Congressional District. The 49 signatures would be enough to put the campaign just over the 500 needed. The campaign is waiting to hear whether the signatures will be accepted. Indiana votes May 8. Santorum's three rivals — Mitt Romney, Newt Gingrich and Ron Paul — have qualified to compete in the primary.

Guidelines set for voters to get photographic ID

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment Office of Vital Statistics has published the guidelines and the affidavit required for Kansas residents requesting a free birth certificate for the purposes of obtaining free photographic identification necessary to vote in Kansas elections.

Starting this year, Kansans must present a photo ID at the polls before voting in local and state government elections in accordance with the voter identification provision of the Kansas Secure and Fair Elections Act. A birth certificate is among the documents the Kansas Department of Revenue Division of Vehicles will accept from Kansans applying for a free nondriver identification card.

To qualify for the free birth certificate for purposes of acquiring a free photo ID from the Division of Vehicles, a person must (1) not possess any documents listed as valid photographic identification documents under Kansas law, (2) lack any of the documents necessary to prove identity; (3) sign an affidavit attesting to items 1 and 2

(4) be registered to vote in Kansas, and (5) have been born in Kansas.

Kansans requesting a birth certificate for the purpose of obtaining a free nondriver identification card:

• Will not be able to get a free driver's license, just a nondriver identification card.

• Cannot simultaneously hold a Kansas driver's license and a Kansas nondriver identification card.

• Will only be issued one birth certificate under this program.

• Can share the forms submitted under this program with other agencies.

2011-2012 academic year.

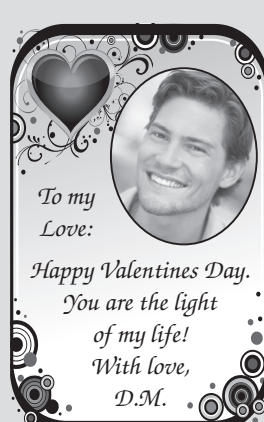

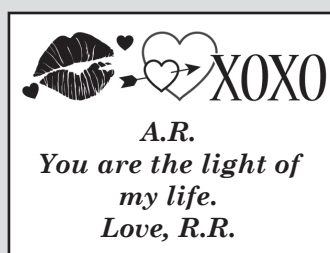

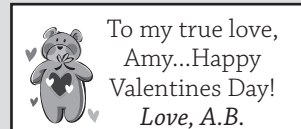
