As we age, we don't see quite as well, glare becomes more annoying, and it's more difficult to differentiate between colors and make out details. Physically, our strength, flexibility, dexterity and endurance decline. Tasks such as grasping, twisting, walking and going up and down stairs become more difficult. Changes in furnishings, lighting, color and de-

sign can help make a home more

accommodating for individuals as

their bodies age. Something as simple as removing throw rugs, installing grab bars by the toilet or tub or adding night lights improves safety in the home. Replacing worn kitchenware with new, easy-to-handle utensils or lighter-weight pots and pans will make it easier for older adults to continue food preparation, just as rearranging the furniture to allow more open space makes it easier to

Dark colors absorb light and make it harder to see. For instance, it will be more difficult to see working in a kitchen with dark countertops, cabinets and floors. A contrasting, light-colored countertop would be easier to work on. Dark and light color contrasts make objects more visible.

Knowing a person's ability to perceive certain colors declines with age, there are some simple changes a person can make to avoid embarrassing mistakes. For instance, avoid buying similar socks or shoes in navy, black and brown. Use colorful placemats beneath dark dishes on a dark wooden table. This will aid vision and help avoid striking the cup on the edge of the plate when the cup is

- Select light colors for walls and ceilings. Use medium colors for floors and wood finishes.


