A Marine from Brewster departed on its final deployment Sunday with three Norfolk-based destroyers to follow Monday.

Lance Cpl. Spencer Holm was to join his squadron of F/A-18 Hornets. He is a member of the Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 251 Thunderbolts, stationed at Marine Corps Air in which John Glenn made the Station Beaufort, S.C. Holm, who graduated from Brewster High School in 2010, is an electronics technician working on the fighter jets.

The Enterprise is part of a strike group which includes the guided-missile destroyers Porter, Nitze and James E. Williams, and the guided-missile cruiser Vicksburg, which deploys Friday from Florida.

While most of the 5,500 sailors and Marines composing the strike group are less than half the age of the Enterprise, Captain Bill Hamilton said, "The crew understands what's at stake and I think we'll do just fine."
