Music camp will offer something for everyone

String players, band students and vocal- traditional drum line preparation. ists can experience a week of quality musical performances and training in classes and workshops from professional specialists Greg Fishman, jazz saxophonist, and Allen Vizzutti, trumpet player and his wife, pianist Laura Vizzutti, at the Fort Hays State University High Plains Music Camp, July 15 to July 21.

For the first time, vocalists will be able to choose, opera, music theater or diction classes as well as sing in the choir.

The camp line-up includes 16 mini courses. • Alternative Strings will explore the different styles of string playing. Students will learn jazz, rock, Celtic and fiddling techniques.

· Conducting fundamentals will allow students to learn the beat patterns, style, score reading and rehearsal techniques for conductors. It is a class for new drum majors or choral-instrumental student directors.

• In double reed making, students will learn the tricks of the trade for making oboe or bassoon reeds. Participants are asked to bring \$10 to cover the expense of materials.

• Drum line fundamentals includes a survey being part of a production. Class members will of rudimentary drum techniques that apply to produce a Broadway musical scene.

• Students learn the basics in electric guitar class. Campers must provide their own instruments and amps.

• Flutists will be able to transform their playing with tips to create better tone, intonation, vibrato and faster fingers in flutists' makeover, which includes an introduction to piccolo technique.

· Introduction to opera will allow students to learn about opera and operetta literature and staging through listening and viewing.

· Jazz bass class will improve electric or upright bass skills to accommodate the many jazz idioms. Campers must provide instruments and amps.

· In jazz improvisation, campers will experiment with "outrageous ideas" and gain comfort performing on their own instruments. Sections are open for saxophone, trumpet and trombone.

· Campers will learn chord changes and voicing to play with jazz combos in jazz piano.

• Rhythm fundamentals will improve counting and rhythmic skills as applied to all styles of music. All first-year and sixth- and seventhgrade campers are enrolled in this class.
