Henry, a farmer in the Brewster area for many years, was born in 1910 and raised on a farm near Campbell, Neb. Following his mother's death when he was 13, he became responsible for the care of four younger siblings while his father worked.

During the 1930s, he signed on with the Civilian Conservation Corps forest service in California. He was promoted to head the surveying crew, contributing to the building of roads and fire lanes in the Sierra Nevadas.

Later in the 1930s, though Henry had only an eighth grade education, he was hired by the engineering department of Douglas Aircraft to work on design and construction of fighter planes. He served as a flight engineer on B-17, B-24 and B-29 aircraft during World War II.

In 1949, Henry rented farm ground south of Brewster, where he worked for maximum productivity on every acre, managed his money frugally and provided essentially all the labor on the farm until he was 88 years old. Until his death in 2002, he made all management decisions on the farm.

Scholarships from the foundation he established are awarded to students from the nine counties of northwest Kansas who are self-starting, determined and have leadership and work experience. Both academic and technical training scholarships are offered.

Lava spirals spotted on Mars

While evidence for lava flows is present in many places on Mars, none are shaped like this latest find. He reported the discovery in the journal Science. The biggest surprise? The largest Martian lava spiral measured 100 feet across – bigger than any on Earth. Pine wilt isolated; keep watching trees

Another case of pine wilt has been found in Thomas County. This is an isolated case and has been properly destroyed. The district forester has been out to survey the area and did not see anymore suspect cases. We will

continue to monitor pine trees in Thomas County to see that we keep pine wilt at bay. If you see around May 1, carrying nemaanything suspicious that may resemble pine wilt, don't hesitate to give me a call so that I can come out and look and take a sample if needed. Below are symptoms to and into the winter. look for.

Symptoms

In Kansas, new pine wilt infections are most apparent from August to December. Trees wilt and die in a short period of time, from several weeks to a few months. In the first stages, the needles turn grey or green, then yellow and brown. The discoloration sometimes occurs branch by branch, sometimes all at once. The brown needles stay on the tree for up to a year after the tree has died. Another key symptom is reduced resin. During part of their life, the nematodes feed on plant cells in the tree's resin canals, stopping the flow of resin. On a healthy tree, sticky resin bleeds from the site of a wound. If a tree has pine wilt, the resin is often reduced or absent, and branches become dry or brittle.

to several months. The nematode and beetles spend the winter in the infected tree. The beetles emerge todes to new trees and continuing the cycle of infection. The beetles may be out this year so continue to monitor throughout the summer

The disease is common in the eastern half of the state, and it is spreading west naturally around 10 miles per year. The western edge of the infestation at this time is a line from Beloit to Hays to Medicine Lodge. However, there are a few scattered specimens just to the west of this line. Scots pines are particularly susceptible. and Scots pine plantings in eastern Kansas have been devastated. Austrian, white and mugo pines are also hosts, but they are not as susceptible as Scots pine. Western Kansas is not yet infested, but there are occasional introductions on firewood or infested nursery stock
