Child center asks for funds

A representative from the Western Kansas Child Advocacy Center asked Thomas County commissioners Monday to double the county's annual contribution.

Vicki Hubin of Scott City presented information about the group and asked for \$5,000, double what the organization received last year. No motion was made, but commissioners indicated the full amount might not be granted.

Hubin said the center's main office is in Scott City, but the agency has locations in Sublette and Colby and recreational vehicles that provide a site for therapy, medical exams and other services on the

The service area covers 29 western Kansas counties, everything west from Seward, Haskell, Ness, Ellis, Rooks and Phillips, she said, and it has provided service in 16 other Kansas counties.

Hubin said the staff is trained to handle cases of sexual abuse against children and even includes a former Kansas Bureau of Investigation agent. She is a nationally certified child forensic interviewer with more than 200 hours of training on how to talk to kids.

The staff also includes nurse examiners trained in dealing with sexual assault who are able to take evidence and examine rape victims so the child doesn't have to go to the hospital. In-house therapy and examination services provide security and comfort to victims.

Hubin said the center staff interviews children in ways that lessen "re-traumatization." It offers advocacy and support services during the investigation and judicial phases of a case and recovery, prevention and extended forensic evaluation provided by a licensed

"We generally have three staff members present at all times," she

Democrats want to get candidate on the ballot

TOPEKA (AP) – Democrats say one of their Kansas House candidates is being denied a spot on the ballot because the secretary of state's office lost his paperwork.

Democratic Party officials said today that they will challenge a decision by Secretary of State Kris Kobach not to list Larry Meeker of Lake Quivira as a candidate for the 17th House District in the

Kansas City area. They had until tonight to file an objection with Kobach's office.

Kobach is a Republican, but House Minority Leader Paul Davis, a Lawrence Democrat, said he doesn't believe the decision against Meeker was motived by politics or malice. Davis said he believes Kobach's office simply

made a mistake. Kobach spokeswoman Kay Curtis said only that his office does not have a form for Meeker.
