Child center asks for more money

said, "and we take care of the kids from the time the incident is reported until after court, and then we help them heal."

"Right now, we are working with one family that we've been with for five years. It's a long process and we never lose touch."

Hubin said that the staff has been in the Colby area about nine times since the beginning of the year and they have never seen just one child each time.

"Before I started as a commissioner, I have to tell you, I thought we lived in a perfect world," said Chairman Ken Christiansen. "I didn't think any of this could happen here in our community. But I was wrong, and I'm sure glad we have a group like you around."

Hubin said statistics show about a quarter of all girls and

one-sixth of all boys are sexually abused before the age of 18, even in western Kansas.

"So, think about that the next time you go out to a restaurant filled with families," she said. "In the two and a half years since I've been with the center, I've never worked a case with a stranger involved. It has always been someone that the child knows, loves and trusts."

"Stranger Danger happens in the cities, not here."

Hubin handed out statistical information for the center, noting that the staff has interviewed more than 1,000 children since the center started up in 2004.

Last year, the staff conducted 245 interviews, she said, a 25 percent increase and about one per working day of the year. Twenty cases have been opened in Thomas County already this year, Hubin said.

Eighty-five percent of the

cases were for sexual abuse, the group reports; 5 percent for physical abuse, 2 percent for emotional abuse and 8 percent were interviewed as a witness to a crime.

Statistics also show that the largest group of children interviewed, 38 percent, were between the ages of 7 and 12. Thirty-three percent of children interviewed were between 2 and 6. Ninety-nine percent of the perpetrators were known to the children and 47 percent were related to the child. Eighty-four percent were caucasian and 23 percent Hispanic or Latino.

The biggest group of perpetrators, 46 percent, are between the ages of 30 and 59. About 14 percent are between 4 and 12; 14 percent between 13 and 17; 34 percent are between 18 and 29; and 2 percent over the age of 60.

Hubin said that money to run

the organization comes from grants and donations, and they operate on a \$350,000 annual budget. However, she said they lost \$100,000 from the National Children's Alliance this year, which paid for a medical staff person and part of a therapist's salary.

"It's essential that the children have access to specially trained medical and mental health professionals to insure they have a chance at recovering from the crimes committed against them," she said.

Thomas County Sheriff Rod Taylor said that the center's services are well known and important to have.

"Law enforcement in western Kansas relies on them more and more," he said. "They have a mobile unit that is helpful and convenient, and they do an excellent job."

McCarty Farms holds open house

Gov. Brownback greeted the crowd next, and jokingly said, "This is probably the biggest thing to happen in Rexford for a while."

"We did it," he said, "in two years of hard work, where no one said, 'no!' It's been a time of collaboration, trust and a little money, and I declare this partnership between the McCarty Family Farms and Dannon to be a good one."

Dannon is a subsidiary of Paris-based Danone (same pronunciation), a major global food producer.

Dairy operations continued in spite of the fact there was a celebration going on just beyond the main entrance. Milking continued as always, taking up 20 hours of the day with the other four spent in washing and cleaning the milking area.

"This is an operation that goes on 365 days a year," said Mike McCarty, who also found time to guide visitors during an open house at the end of the day. "Each plant has a code number, so if you buy a cup of yogurt and it has #48 on it, you'll know it's made from milk at this plant."

The open house saw visitors touring every part of the facility. They learned the average milk production per cow per day is 72 pounds; the plant takes in eight semi-trailer loads of raw milk a day and loads out four loads of condensed milk; and workers

are either unloading or loading around the clock.

Visitors also saw the milking parlor, where employees milk 250 cows every hour, and heard about how workers cares for the cows, which produce best when they are treated well and have a quiet, calm atmosphere.

Comments overheard as the tours traveled from barn to barn included, "everything is so clean," "this looks like a park" and "I think this is probably the best yogurt I've ever eaten!"

The McCarty family got its start in the dairy business more than 90 years ago, beginning and ending every day by milking cows by hand in a small barn without electricity in northeast Pennsylvania. And now, four generations later, the family is still starting and ending its day milking cows. The technology has changed, but much has stayed the same - including the family's commitment to their animals, to the land they live on and to their community.

The family said more than 1,200 people toured the dairy on Wednesday, enjoying free yogurt at the end of the tour. They said 500 people toured the condensing plant.
