Helm said it's also possible that something could have happened on their end of the line and could have kicked the city off its line without anything happening on the city's end.

On Thursday morning, the area of north Franklin Avenue lost power at about 9 a.m. for about 15 to 20 minutes. The Colby Free Press was part of the outage, which was only a "brown out," meaning some of the power was still on.


