

Bridge • Steve Becker

You have the following hand,

1. Your partner opens One Notrump, and your right-hand opponent bids Two Hearts. What would you bid now?

2. Your partner opens One Spade, and you respond Two Clubs. Partner rebids Two Spades. What would you bid now?

3. Your right-hand opponent opens Three Hearts, and, after two passes, your partner doubles. What would you bid now?

4. Your partner opens One Spade, and you respond Two Clubs. Partner rebids Two Notrump. What would you bid now?

Bidding Quiz

1. Three notrump. You can't guarantee three notrump, but the odds heavily favor making it. 2 Partner is extremely likely to have at least one heart stopper, so nine tricks in notrump, with the help of your club suit, are very probable.

Five clubs could be a better contract, but there's no practical way of investigating that possibility without giving up on the notrump game. 2 You could bid three clubs over two hearts, but most players treat this bid as nonforcing, and that might end the auction.

2. Four spades. True, you have only 10 highcard points, but game is nevertheless probable after partner rebids spades, showing extra length in the suit. Your singleton heart has enormous value. It would be overly cautious to bid only three spades, as partner is unlikely to lose four tricks.

3. Five clubs. To bid only four clubs would not come anywhere close to doing your hand justice, since you could make the same bid with four or five small clubs and a worthless hand. The jump to five clubs represents your values fairly accurately. If partner passes, you'll probably make just five; if he raises to six clubs, you'll probably make that also.

4. Three spades. You could take a stab at three notrump, but, considering your 6-3-3-1 distribution, the hand will almost surely play better in spades.

The three-spade bid (forcing) asks partner to choose between spades and notrump, depending on his hand. Since you are in no position to judge what is best, you should let partner make the final decision. If he has something like: [S] Q8532 [H] AQ5 [D] KJ4 [C] Q6, three notrump is by far the best contract.
