Legislature wants audit of new system

AP Statehouse Correspondent TOPEKA – A legislative committee in Kansas ordered an audit Tuesday of a \$40 million upgrade of the state computer system handling vehicle registrations, reflecting bipartisan frustration with recent weeks in some counties for residents getting their annual car

But the Legislative Post Audit Committee also honored a request from Revenue Secretary Nick Jordan to delay the start of auditing until later this year, so that the review doesn't delay work by his Democrat who initially sought the department's Division of Vehicles to fix computer problems. Kansas wheat crop up 43 percent this year

WICHITA (AP) – A new government report estimates that Kansas farmers harvested 396 million bushels of winter wheat this year.

The Kansas Agricultural Statistics Service said today that would make this harvest 43 percent larger

than last year's drought-stricken crop. It is also up 2 percent from last month's forecast.

The agency says this year's crop was cut off of 9 million acres, making it the largest area harvested since 2006 in Kansas. The average yields were 44 bushels per acre, far better than the 35 bushels
