County OKs rules for jail project

the acting city manager as well. Commissioners have a right to change the board “to better serve the needs of the community” later. For example, if in the future, the county decides to build a new building for the Road and Bridge Department, they could appoint the department’s supervisor in place of the police chief. During the phone conference on June 25, bond lawyer Kevin Cowan of Gilmore and Bell said the building commission doesn’t necessarily have to be an active

group, “but would act as a conduit to facilitate whatever the county wants them to do. They would simply do things they are requested to do by the county.” The commission would issue, sell and receive the money for bonds as a municipal corporation, said Cowan. The members would sign contracts, but they have no authority to take action on anything without the county’s approval. They would work under specific limits set out by state law, he added. The second resolution requests to sell bonds for \$2.6 million to pay for the jail additions

and remodeling. The remaining balance of \$600,000 will come from available money within the county’s budget and the sheriff’s drug forfeiture fund. Cowan said no election is required with the building commission financing option unless there is a protest petition. A resolution of intent must be published for public notification, followed by a 30-day protest period. To push for an election, the opponents must get at least 5 percent of the county’s population to sign a petition. The resolution to create the building commission is also subject to protest if the lesser of 2 percent of the county’s qualified voters or 100 voters petition for protest. Commissioners will meet again at 2 p.m. on Monday at the courthouse. Discussion of the jail project will resume at 3:30 p.m., with members of the building commission present. Haas and Cowan will discuss the building commission’s responsibilities with them, provide options for a payment schedule and field questions. The building commission itself will discuss the second resolution and vote either to approve or deny it.

College trustees discuss contract issues

experience in residence life, he has a master’s degree in leadership development, so he’ll do a good job.” Wells asked what Doug Johnson’s job is. Nichols said he is the director of student support services, but his work is not the same as Keefer’s. Trustee Bill Shields asked how many students are enrolled in a course art instructor Rebel Jay teaches called the History of Medieval Renaissance Cultures. Vice Chair Cindy Black pointed out that it said three on the report. Washburn said next time Jay teaches that class, she plans to divide it among the music, the art and the history instructors so it might draw more students. Washburn said the class is a general education course and is not required, so an instructor who chooses to teach the class will be paid per student per year attended. Chairman Arlen Leiker asked if there’s a way to separate out Title III items from regular expenses mainly because the board doesn’t know how much has been spent and how much is left of the grant. Alan Waites, vice president of business affairs and chief financial officer, said they already do that for most accounts, but it would be almost impossible to do for payment of claims. The board then approved the contracts as listed as well as the other items of the consent agenda, which were the minutes of

the June 18 and July 9 meetings, agreements and a resolution for payment of claims. Before approving the claims, Leiker said some people who turn in their payment claims do a really nice job of providing details for Visa payments, but others leave that section blank, and he wants to know those details. He also cautioned everyone that the college is low on cash, and expenses at Starbucks, taverns and the like could be perceived badly. President Stephen Vacik said the college has looked at the possibility of using a per diem system, or a daily allowance for expenses, rather than getting receipts, but there are many pros and cons, and he said they are still discussing it. Vacik said the college has also been looking at its vehicles and may try to downsize its fleet and reduce the number of trips being made. “So I can assure you, we are looking at that,” Vacik said. “That’s not being missed.” In other business, the board: • Heard a report from Nichols, who said the college is up 2,000 credit hours from this time last year. • Heard from Washburn, who said they are getting ready for a fall training session for the staff. Leiker asked why the college isn’t listed as a participating school for the EdtoGo program, and Washburn said it should be, but they might not be until a student is enrolled in the program. She said

she will have Deb Schwanke, public information director, distribute a press release about the program again once she returns from vacation. Shields asked what the response has been to the four-day class week, and Washburn said it’s all been positive. Vacik said they will see the proof in the final numbers, which will be done in September. • Heard from Wells about the college Endowment Foundation. He said the Maxine Nelson scholarships are continuing to grow and will be worth about \$4,500 this year. He added that applications were sent out for those scholarships to as many students as possible. • Elected the 2012-2013 officers, including Leiker as chairman; Black, vice chair; Vacik, secretary; and Wells, treasurer. The board also elected Leiker as its representative to the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees and Wells as the ex officio member to the college foundation board. • Tabled the approval of bank depositories and authorized signatures and approval of a lease agreement with the Norton County Hospital. Waites said changes need to be made to the signature cards and he will try to have those ready for the August meeting. Vacik said he and John Gatz, college attorney, had some concerns about the lease agreement and said he would try to bring that back to the board at the same meeting.

Utah airport’s security scrutinized after breach

observed at all times, “and I would dare say it isn’t at any airport in the country.” SkyWest spokeswoman Marissa Snow said Hedglin had been a pilot for the airline since 2005. He had been on administrative leave since July 13, the day police found the body of his girlfriend and fellow Colorado National Guard member, Christina Comejo, in Colorado Springs. Authorities say she had been stabbed multiple times. Hedglin was the key suspect but had not been charged. Colorado Springs police said they asked SkyWest to deactivate his access cards in case he showed up at the airline anywhere in the country. How the 40-year-old was able to gain access to the plane remained unclear.

The Gazette of Colorado Springs, citing court records, reported Hedglin dated Comejo for four years and was arrested in March. He was accused of harassing her. The records show that a restraining order was issued against Hedglin, and he was set for trial in August. He was released on \$10,000 bond. Attorney Steven Rodemer, who represented Hedglin in that case, said he was facing misdemeanor charges of criminal mischief, theft and harassment, but felony charges were dismissed Thursday. Rodemer said he hadn’t seen Hedglin since their last court date that day. A police officer making rounds at the airport early Tuesday found a motorcycle with the engine running outside the perimeter fence, Mortenson said. As he searched for the owner, the officer came upon the idling

plane and called SkyWest. The airline sent an employee to turn off the engine. Inside, Hedglin was found dead with a gunshot wound to his head. Snow noted that an inexperienced person could not have operated the plane, but she did not explain how Hedglin got aboard. Hedglin was a part-time soldier who worked as a cook in the Colorado National Guard. He had no specialized military training and was never deployed, Capt. Darin Overstreet said. Comejo was a full-time soldier who served in the Colorado Army National Guard’s 100th Missile Defense Brigade in Colorado Springs. He enlisted in June 2006, became a second lieutenant last year and was named a distinguished honor graduate in two training programs. She had recently begun training as a current operations officer.
