Procedure helps claim damages

Dear Heloise: I bought a pair of porcelain candleholders on a recent trip. I packed them carefully (in air-pocket wrap) in my checked luggage. Upon my return home, the candleholders were unwrapped, and one was damaged. What can I do? – A Reader, via e-mail

There is something you can do, and it's good information for all of my readers.

According to the Transportation Security Administration, travelers can file a claim for broken or damaged items if they believe the administration is responsible. Be aware that there are more than a dozen airports that use other screening services and do not accept agency claims.

To file a claim, you need to download or request a claim package from the administration and submit all required paperwork. Download the packet at www.TSA.gov. The main phone number for the Transportation Security Administration is (866) 289-9673, and the claims management branch fax number is (571) 227-1904.

Some of the things you may be asked for are:

- Purchase receipt (credit-card receipt or, if not available, a bank statement).
- Baggage tags or boarding passes.
- Repair or replacement estimates.
- Photographs of items (if you have them – Heloise).

Mail or fax claim documents to the Claims Management Branch. Within three weeks, you should receive an acknowledgment letter with instructions. But the claim itself can take anywhere from two to six months to complete.

The agency may not repack items as carefully as you had originally (if at all). So if something is important or valuable to you, put it in your carry-on or have it shipped directly to your house. – Heloise

Some bidding sequences are regarded as impossible — that is, you can't have a hand that fits the bid or bids you've made. In each of the following five cases, specify whether South's last bid is Possible or Impossible:

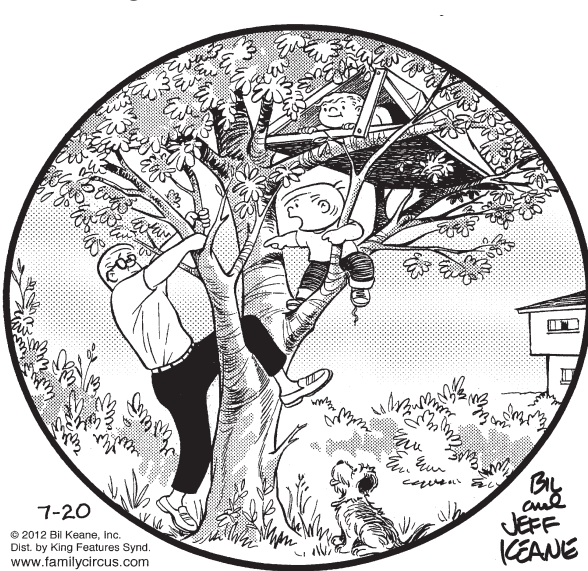
1. North 1♥, East Dble, South Reddle, West 1♠. Pass, Pass, Pass, Pass.
2. North 1♣, East Pass, South 2♣, West Pass. 3♥, Pass, Pass, Pass.
3. South 1NT, West Pass, North 3NT, East Pass. 4♥, Pass, West 1♥, East Pass. 1♣, Pass, Pass, 2♦, Pass.
4. South 1♣, West Pass, North 1♥, East Pass. 1♣, Pass, Pass, 2♦, Pass.
5. North 1♦, East Pass, South 1♥, West Pass. 2♣, Pass, Pass, Pass.

Bidding Quiz

- Impossible. The redouble promised 10 or more points, so South must bid over one spade, since his side has substantially more than half the 40 points in the deck. Note also that North's hand is unlimited; he could have a very good hand and pass one spade, knowing that South cannot allow the bidding to die.
- Impossible. North and South have agreed on spades as trumps, so South can hardly pass three clubs. North is probing for a game or slam and cannot suddenly be left high and dry in three clubs. The least South can do is bid three spades.
- Impossible. North's three-notrump bid says, "We have enough points for game, but not enough for a slam, even if you have a maximum." South therefore cannot bid four notrump.
- Impossible. It is a fundamental principle of bidding that a new suit bid by responder is 100 percent forcing. South must therefore bid again. North's two-diamond bid implies a reasonable hand of at least 10 high-card points and could be much stronger.
- Possible. A new suit bid by opener is not forcing, so responder may pass with minimal values (six or seven points) and a preference for opener's second suit. With more (or the same number of) cards in opener's first suit, responder must return opener to that suit regardless of how weak his hand might be.
