

Obama releases \$70M for military

Barack Obama said today he is releasing an additional \$70 million in military aid for Israel, a previously announced move that appeared timed to upstage Republican rival Mitt Romney's trip to Israel this weekend.

Extreme heat may be new norm in Kansas

KEITH SEBELIUS RESER-VOIR (AP) – Mike Lentz watched in amazement as the digital readout to his thermometer ticked higher and higher in late June. It hit 111. Then 113.

When it hit 117.1, "I thought,

wow," said Lentz, the Bureau of Reclamation's dam superinten-

About 5 minutes later, it hit 118 - a record for the Bureau of Reclamation shop below the dam holding back the lake water.

It also was the hot spot in the nation – 20 degrees hotter than Death Valley National Park. It was only 3 degrees warmer than Hill City, about 35 miles to the south where back-to-back temperatures of 115 degrees brought national attention.
