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# Council will proceed with search

The Mayor and City Council will continue their search for a city manager on Monday, with plans to interview two new candidates at City Hall.

A press release from the city said officials hope to have a new city manager on the job by September to replace Carolyn Armstrong, who retired on June 15.

The release introduced the two new candidates:

• Brenton Lewis was a city administrator of Minden, Neb., for over 19 years. He has also served as a city manager in Henderson, Texas, and a finance director in Perryton, and Allen, Texas. He holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from West Texas State University.

• Tyson McGreer has been an administrator and economic development director in Grant, Neb., since 2008. In the private sector, he has worked as a division manager at Hi-Line Cooperative and Energy Specialist at Cenex Har-

vest States, both in Elsie, Neb. He has a bachelor's degree in industrial distribution at the University

Both candidates will submit a writing assignment, meet the department heads and take a tour of the city's facilities.

Four other candidates were interviewed in closed session meetings on July 10 and 11 at City Hall. These were Gary Bradley, former city administrator of Grain Valley, Mo.; Bret Glendening, former city manager of Osawatomie, who now works for Kiewit Power Constructors; Dawn Jaeger, assistant city administrator of Great Bend; and Lynne Ladner, city administrator of Hiawatha.

TOPEKA – A Kansas judge on Thursday dismissed 26 misdemeanor charges against a Kansas City-area Planned Parenthood clinic, honoring a prosecutor's request to further narrow a criminal case over allegations the clinic performed illegal late-term abor-

Johnson County District Attorney Steve Howe confirmed Thursday night that District Judge Ste-

phen Tatum signed an order late in the afternoon at Howe's request. Tatum's action is noted in online court records, but without any de-
