If it grows, look for tiny mites

few prejudices. They're perfectly willing to feed on an estimated 1,100 different plant species.

"They're also willing to feed from the time they hatch until they die – through every one of their developmental stages," said Raymond Cloyd, K-State Research and Extension entomologist.

The two-spotted mites are houseplants' No. 1 pest, sometimes enclosing whole leaves in their webbing. In fact, Cloyd said, the pests are so tiny that webbing can be the first clue of an indoor infestation. (Wind and rain typically dispose of webbing spun

Two spotted spider mites also are major damage-causers from commercial greenhouse to farm field – where they attack corn, cotton and soybeans. They like wild and weedy plants, too, ranging from berry thickets, Jimson weed
