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The Colby High varsity football team lost it first home game of the season Friday, falling to the Scott City Beavers 47-7 at Den-

Coach Chris Gardner said it was a disappointing loss, but the Eagles (1-1 overall, 0-1 Great West Activities Conference) are still a

The Eagles were driving down the field on the following possession, but with 8:51 left in the first, senior quarterback Zane Winger was intercepted by a Scott City defender. He ran the ball back for another touchdown. With a successful extra-point kick, the Beavers led 14-0.






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
