Although she's new to the office, Laura Krejci had served the parochial school for eight years before she was offered the job as principal. Since 2004, she has been the director of religious education and music teacher.

In addition to being the principal, she said, she'll continue teaching music part time. Church members Megan Augustine and Alex Williams have taken over as co-directors for religious education

"I've always had a passion for kids and music," said Krejci, "and became interested in teaching when I was in college after getting scholarships to participate in music. Teaching just seemed to be the perfect fit for me."

When Everett retired, Krejci said, she was offered the position by Father Dana Clark, who said he wanted to fill the vacancy with someone who loves the school and the kids.
