This win put the Bulldogs at 1-1 on the season as they prepared for their Homecoming exhibition with Greeley County.

The first quarter of the game started off with the Bobcats receiving, but stops by Jesus Garcia, Camron Spresser and Chance Hoeting along with the 'Dogs defensive squad stopped their advance and gave the home team possession. Following a short gain by Tristan Schwarz, Andrew Luna sprinted for the end zone to score a 29-yard touchdown. With just four minutes off the clock, the 'Dogs were pushed back on the extra-point attempt and held a 6-0 lead.

Following a kick-off return, the Bulldogs stopped numerous attempts by the Bobcats to move the ball. As the Bobcats approached the goal line, the 'Dogs were able to recover the ball on the 3-yard line with 77 yards ahead of them. Carries by Schwarz and Luna gained a first down. Additional runs by Jose Bermudez, Schwarz and Luna gained yards, but the Bulldogs were forced to punt back to the Bobcats. The hometown defense stopped the Bobcats as the first quarter buzzer sounded.

On the first play of the second quarter, Luna sprinted down the field for a 50-yard touchdown run. A pass from Grant Spresser to Joseph Koerperich was good giving the Bulldogs a 14-0 lead with 11:50 still to play in the first half.
