

"For instance, right now it's football season, so we can expect a lot of brown bottles and aluminum cans. If a load comes from a hospital, we know it'll consist of a lot of plastics. Nursing homes' trash has a lot of adult diapers and we know that trash from schools will compress easily because kids throw out a lot of milk. Wet trash is easiest to compress."

Chappelle said an area's demographics have a lot to do with what is thrown away. This is good, he said, because knowing the characteristics of trash can help an operator optimize capacity.

'It's necessary to know the age and education of people, and to know if trash comes from a residential area or single-family home, a restaurant or a business district," he said. "Studies have told us that trash in rural areas generate a mixture of residential and commercial trash."

He said commercial areas' trash has a lot more food, paper

kinds of trash trucks compress garbage differently. He said trucks that load from the back have more difficulty getting quality compaction as hydrau-

lics get older. These are the kinds of trucks that Colby has, said Weber. Chappelle said that as this happens, it costs the landfill more because they have to work the garbage more, which burns more fuel.

Things that people can do to make their landfill more efficient, Chappelle said, include the obvious solutions, such as recycling as much as possible. Secondly, he said, people should compress their trash before it is put into the garbage can at home.

There is even a right way and a wrong way to crush cans and milk jugs, he said. After weeks of secrecy surrounding the case, most of the documents filed in court were released to the public today.

Holmes, 24, faces 152 charges in the July 20 shooting at an Aurora movie theater during a special midnight showing of the new Batman movie, "The Dark Knight Rises."

The attack killed 12 people and injured 58 others.

The defense has a psychiatry expert on its defense team and plans to use him as an expert, giving further insight into a possible insanity defense by James Holmes, the documents showed.

Defense attorneys claim Holmes is mentally ill, raising the possibility that Holmes will plead not guilty by reason of insanity.

In court, prosecutors suggested Holmes was angry at the failure of a once promising academic career and stockpiled weapons, ammunition, tear gas grenades, and body armor as his research deteriorated and professors urged him to get into another profession.

### Department revises wheat estimate

WICHITA (AP) – A new government estimate reduces the size of this year's winter wheat harvest in Kansas.

Kansas Agricultural Statistics Service reported year. today the state harvested 382.2 million bushels of winter wheat.

The new number is about 1 percent lower than pared with the drought-stricken harvest of last planted to wheat in the fall of 2011. year.

Growers in Kansas this year hauled in the largest winter wheat crop since 2003.

The grain was cut from 9.1 million acres this

That is 15 percent more wheat acres than the previous harvest.

It would have been even higher had farmers been last month's report. But it is up 38 percent com- able to harvest all of the 9.5 million acres they had

Yields were estimated at 42 bushels per acre.
