Bod Pod testing available at college

Students enrolled in the Physi- and exercise. Participants need to cal Therapist Assistant program at Colby Community College are being trained on state-of-the-art equipment that measures an individual's percent and absolute amounts of fat and lean body

mass. The Bod Pod is used to measure body mass and estimate body composition. In addition, it estimates the resting metabolic rate and total energy expenditure in those over 10 years old.

"The Bod Pod was purchased with funds from a Perkins' grant," said program director Pat Erickson. "We are the only facility with a Bod Pod from Denver to Kansas City.'

The equipment uses densitometry to estimate fat and lean mass. To accomplish this, users get inside the unit and allow the air to be withdrawn. A computer printout is provided following three short tests. The entire process requires about 10 minutes per person.

"The Bod Pod is the 'gold' standard in body composition testing," said Erickson. "The test requires edu for an appointment. Testing is two hours of fast from food, water by appointment only.

wear a swimsuit or underwear for testing."

The printout includes weight, percent of body fat and percent of lean mass. A certain amount of fat is necessary for good health. For men, the minimal amount of essential fat is approximately 3 to 5 percent. For women, essential fat is approximately 12 to 15 percent.

If too much fat accumulates over the years, health may be compromised. Lean mass is everything except the fat. It includes muscle. water, bone and internal organs. Healthy levels of lean mass contribute to physical fitness and may prevent conditions such as osteoporosis.

The college is making the instrument available to the public at a cost of \$10. This includes the initial test and retesting after the recommended time frame. It is accurate for anyone over 10 years old to a weight of approximately 525 pounds.
