the first exclaimed.

"My father is a nun,"

"They're all women."

"I don't know, but whenever anyone asks him what his religion is, he always answers, 'none.'

So began one of the religious blogs I read regularly. It was written in response to a recent survey on American religion from the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life stating that one in five Americans have no religious affiliation. On the survey this group was labeled the "nones" and it had increased from 15 percent five years ago to 19 percent this year.

That is about 46 million Americans. Many consider themselves atheists or agnostic. However, more than two-thirds of the "nones" said they believe in God, more than half said they frequently feel a deep spiritual connection with nature and the Earth, more than one-third see themselves as "spiritual but not religious," and one in five pray daily. One-third of adults under thirty do not see themselves as members of any religious tradition.

It seems that many of the "nones" are not turned off by God, but by the various organized religious groups who are more concerned with their own rules, procedures, privileges, political clout, money, prestige and power. But they really like the church's efforts to feed the hungry, to care for the vulnerable in the world and to strengthen society. Since this first blog appeared I have read several

zis for his stance against the nationalized church in Germany. In his book "Letters from Prison," Bonhoeffer wrote that "the church is only the church when it exists for others." He urged the churches to show what it means to live in Jesus Christ and to live for others. The church should not be in the business of reaching for power, wealth or political influence, but should exhibit such traits as trust, loyalty, patience, discipline, humility and modesty.

I agree with Bonhoeffer. I sometimes wonder if today's Christians are willing to take the risks of living fully in Christ and being willing to challenge the cultural status quo, which seems to value power, wealth and self-interest more than trust, humility and caring for others. Our challenge as Christians is to show the "nones" that the Christian faith is more than doctrines and dogma and more than infighting between and within denominations. Our call is to share the love and grace of Jesus Christ with others, to exhibit his presence in the world and to offer care in a hurting world.

Twentieth century theologian Karl Barth has said, "Grace that is not exhibited is not really grace at all." I would add that Christians who do not model Jesus Christ to the world are Christians in name


