Evangelist to speak in Colby on Sunday

Katherine Newlon, a television evangelist and teacher from Colorado Springs, will speak at the 10:15 service Sunday at the College Drive Assembly of God Church.

Newlon's services are known for miracles and healings.

She says she grew up on the East Coast, in Virginia and North Carolina, and has been on her own since age 13. She said her mother was a missionary who loved working in Africa. When her husband told her he was not going back to Africa to be with "those" people and moved out, she added, her mother's life took a drastic turn.

"My mother went downhill fast, and took up a life style that didn't resemble that of a missionary," she said, adding that her mother moved out and eventually died of a drug overdose.

"My mother had been of a faith denomination that believed that if you sinned, God hated you," she said. "They just didn't actually understand the depth of God's love."

Newlon said that as a 13 year old, her life was much easier after her mother moved out because she had to take care of her mother as if she was a child.

"I had two and sometimes three jobs at one time," she recalled, adding that she learned about the goodness of God. "I always had shelter, I had food to eat and could always pay my rent. There was always just enough."

She said she was walking on the beach when she was 17, she was talking to God and saying, "I think you have something more in store for me, Lord."

She said she talked to God a lot, but this time it was different because she actually heard him answer. He said he wanted her to do

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biophysics and ministry.

"I actually laughed," she said. "I didn't even know what biophysics was, so when I got home, I looked it up, and it looked every bit to me like it would take a math degree and a PhD to do biophysics."

"I had ... attended seventh grade for only a few weeks, but had gotten my GED. I just thought, 'All right, God.'"

So Newlon enrolled in college ... and although she tried hard, couldn't even get past remedial math.

"I said, 'Alright, God, how can I do this great thing you want me to do when I can't even pass simple math?'"

She said God laughed at her and said, "you're going to pass math and it's going to be your major."

"So I was determined that if I was going to fail at something, I was going to do it while I was working at what God had told me to do."

Newlon said she began understanding and began getting good grades. She graduated with honors. In 2008, she moved to Colorado Springs to enroll in Andrew Womak Bible College to finish what God had revealed as a part of His plan for her life.

She said while in class one day, she had a vision that God wanted her in full-time ministry. So being obedient, she did that for a couple of years. Then at the urging of her husband, she moved into television ministry.

It's been 20 years since that walk on the beach, she said, and by January, her televised ministry will be in millions of homes throughout the world.

Newlon credits her husband for running the ministry and says her only duty is to be the voice.

The service will begin with praise and worship at 10:15 a.m. at the church, 245 College Dr. Everyone is welcome.

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God is aware of pain, though we don't notice

Some time ago I read the book of Job in the New Living Bible. I had read it in the New American Standard Bible, but in the words of the Living Bible, it was like reading it for the first time.

One thing that came alive to me was Elihu's rebuke of Job. You may remember that poor Job was visited in his distress by four "friends." Elihu was the youngest of the four and waited till his older companions and Job had finished speaking before offering his opinion.

Despite his youth, Elihu proved to be the wisest of all. All of the others, including Job, said things that displeased God; but Elihu's insights seemed to build the platform from which God himself would speak to Job.

Elihu said many wise things we need to remember in those times when we find our own faith being tested, but this truth caught my attention:

"It is wrong to say God doesn't listen, to say the Almighty isn't concerned. And it is even more false to say he doesn't see what is going on."

In arguing with his friends Job had said all of these things, and Elihu rebukes him, saying, "You have spoken like a fool."

It is easy in our times of physical, emotional and spiritual pain to make the same mistake and think that God isn't listening, he doesn't care or doesn't see. This is wrong. He hears, he cares and he sees. We accept this by faith.

Our eyes are not as good as

God's. We are terribly near-sighted. We cannot see beyond our immediate circumstances. This is why we need faith.

What is faith? A decision we make to believe even though we can see no reason for doing so. It is the choice we make when we decide to believe there is a purpose for our pain.

When we choose to believe, it is as though God puts a pair of glasses on our nearsighted eyes. We still cannot see as clearly as we would like to see — and we still may not be able to see the reasons for our sufferings — but we are enabled to see God and in seeing him we can believe that there must indeed be a purpose in our suffering.

Faith enables us to see that God is at work in it all, using even our suffering for his good purposes. Seeing this, our hands of faith can then reach out and grab hold of the wtruth the Apostle Peter spoke of when he said, "our momentary, light afflictions are producing for us a weight of glory beyond all comprehension."

Once we do this we will be able to say what Job said, "When He has tried me; I shall come forth as gold." That is the reward of faith.
