City approves new maps for Colby electrical system

The City of Colby will have new maps of its electric system early next year, the City Council decided at its meeting last Tuesday.

The council approved a contract with Midland GIS Solutions to make the maps. The Missouribased company will probably start working early next year and take three weeks to finish, City Manager Tyson McGreer said.

"Essentially, they're going to map our electrical system," McGreer said at the meeting. "We, from what I've been told, have very suspect maps

The project was made possible by a grant from the Kansas Municipal Energy Association through the Federal Emergency Management Agency to help cities with mitigate hazards from a possible

The grant will cover most of the \$14,559 project, but the city will still have to pay \$4,804.

"This was a real good way to get our electrical system mapped," McGreer said after the meeting.

The city has most of its system mapped, he said, but changes have been made since the last maps were done.

The new maps will include the city's whole power-supply infrastructure, down to the last elec-
