## Goodland doctor flew on house calls in 1930s

Goodland made house calls, he took his doctor's bag and his pilot's license.

From the 1930s through the 1960s, "The Flying Doctor" served remote areas of northwest Kansas, sometimes flying 50 miles each day to check on a heart patient or up to 300 miles for an emergency at an isolated ranch. For rural northwest Kansans in the mid-20th century, Dr. Renner's flying house calls were often the difference between life and death.

Dr. Renner's work story, and the stories of other northwest Kansas workers, will be on display Saturday, Dec. 15, through Sunday, Jan. 27, when the exhibition "The Way We Worked" is at the High Plains Museum, 1717 Cherry Ave. in Goodland. The museum is one of six hosts of the Kansas Tour of "The Way We Worked," sponsored by the Kansas Humanities our 125th anniversary this year," Council in partnership with the Smithsonian Institution.

When Dr. Marion J. Renner of plane aided him in difficult calls, through boom and bust.' including flying over 15 miles of flooded roads to deliver several babies or landing between snow drifts to fly a desperately ill patient to the hospital.

"Goodland has had many visionaries who served as leaders for the development of our community," said Karen Anderson, director of the museum.

"A fine example is Dr. Renner. A man invested in his community, he sought to increase the capacity and growth of Goodland through his particular skill set: his flying capabilities and his medical knowledge. He provided health care and made key connections outside the community...."

Renner's story is featured in "125 Years of Work," the museum's companion exhibition to "The Way We Worked."
