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Pampered poinsettias respond with beauty and lasting health

selling container plants. Each year, more than 65 million of them sell in the United States alone - in a matter of about six weeks.

Choose plants that have clean, healthy, dark green leaves and colorful bracts. Be sure to check the underside of the leaves for insects. Avoid plants with missing leaves or bruised, broken or spraydamaged leaves. Plants shedding yellow pollen are over-mature. Healthy plants last longer and are worth the extra price.

On a cold day – below 40°F – wrap the plant and pot in paper for the trip home and purchase at the end of the shopping trip. Even a slight chill or draft can cause the leaves to drop later. Unwrap the plant as soon as you get home and place it in bright light away from cold or hot air drafts. Pierce the foil at the bottom of the pot for drainage. Water with lukewarm water if the soil is dry. For exact directions on how to best care for vour poinsettia, and perhaps get the added bonus of enjoying the blooms through April, and definitely getting your money's worth, read on.

The care is more challenging than just keeping the plants alive through Christmas, but it isn't difficult. Ward Upham, horticulturist with Kansas State University Research and Extension, recommends the following as ways to extend the plants' most attractive

Handle with care. Poinsettias are fairly brittle, so their branches will snap off.

soil. When the soil is dry at that depth, give them a drink.

For watering, carry the plant to a sink. Use lukewarm water to replace the soil moisture. Stop applying when water begins to run out of the pot's drainage holes. Discard the drainage water.

2. Sunlight. Poinsettias prefer is preferable.

3. Temperature. Fortunately, their temperature needs aren't too different from human comfort zones. They like daytime temperatures between 65 and 75 de-

Corrections

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1. Moisture. Moisture can be the make-or-break factor. If the plants dry out to the point of wilting, poinsettias drop leaves. If they're too wet, they develop root rot. They may be pretty and come circled with a bow. But, aluminum and plastic pot wrappings block water drainage. Either remove them or punch drainage holes in the bottom. For best results, check your poinsettias' moisture daily. Stick your finger an inch into their

living in the brightest area available – up to and including sunny windows. Place the plant in a sunny window or the brightest area of a room – six hours of light per day

between 60 and 65 F. Temperatures above 75 degrees shorten bloom life. Those below 60 cause root rot. Poinsettias are a bit finicky as they don't appreciate drafts – hot

or cold. So avoid cold draft areas by exterior doors and hot dry areas by heat vent ducts, fireplaces and some appliances.

Window display sites can be tricky. Contact with cold windowpanes can damage plants. The air close to windows can be significantly colder than the average room temperature, particularly fice.

poinsettias away from windows at night or draw the drapes between plants and windows.


