# Grains program trains members new to state wheat commissions

Wheat Commissioners Training Program held Dec. 10 to 12.

Throughout the week, participants attended presentations from Mark Fowler, milling specialist and program associate director; Justin Gilpin, chief executive of Kansas Wheat; and Dave Krishock, flour quality and baking specialist. To start the course, participants were in the classroom learning about the classes and quality of wheat, milling math and blending.

"We came to get an education about what we do," says Tom Zwainz, director for the Washington Grain Commission and a wheat farmer there. "When we get new directors, we need to send them through these types of trainings to give them a better foundation with
