
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County **OKs** raises for two areas

ing raise which all county employees got beginning Jan. 1. Emergency Medical Services

Director Joe Hickert got approval to increase his total for staff wages by \$1 per hour and allowed to forego his cost of living increase so the money could be divided between two of his employees who ing the two raises. In addition to had finished advanced training.

2 percent increase was met with surprise, but was accepted.

"I love it here, guys," he said. "I believe I am already adequately compensated and will not accept an increase. This will save Thomas County \$1,500 of the \$2,080 requested.

"The 2 percent increase, while very fair, will not compensate these two for their efforts or the benefits the citizens of our county will receive from their additional training and abilities."

Hickert said he will remain within his 2013 budget after givtheir cost-of-living increase, Mor-Hickert's proposal to reject the ton will get 30 cents an hour for an annual salary of \$33,218. Bryant's rate will be increased 70 cents per hour, giving her \$37,190 per year. Hickert makes \$75,000 per year.

During the season, the varsity team placed at several meets: at




