Colby girls squad dominates Larned

The Colby High varsity girls basketball team won easily Tuesday, taking out Larned High School 54-11 in the first round of the Class 4A substate tournament held at the high school gym.

The Lady Eagles will play the next round in Pratt, where they will face Hugoton in the semifinals at 6 p.m. Friday.

The Colby girls started their scoring in the first minute with a three-point shot from senior Kenzie Curry. About 30 seconds later, senior McKenna Ortner scored another basket.

Larned scored 2 points early in the first quarter, but that would be all the Lady Eagles would allow.

The teams traded possessions for a couple of minutes until freshman Brenly Terrell sank 2 free throws at the 4:28 mark. A minute later, a foul by Larned sent junior Haileigh Shull to the line, where she made 1 of her 2 free throws.

Senior Lauren Bell got on the board with a threepointer with 2:18 left in the quarter, followed by a two-pointer at 1:10. In between Bell's shot, senior Karly Kriss was 1 of 2 at the free-throw line. Curry closed out the first quarter with another three. The Lady Eagles led 17-2 heading into the second.

Larned made the first basket of the second quarter, a three-pointer, but the Lady Indians would manage only 1 more point before the half.

Sophomore Hannah Strange scored with 6:40 on the clock and Bell followed with another three about 20 seconds later. After a timeout by Larned, Kriss made a jumper with 4:35 left. Shull went back to the line for a one-and-one, making the first shot but not

Curry and Kriss each landed two more baskets and

Colby led 29-6 at the break.

The Lady Eagles piled on the points in the third, with Ortner getting 4 points within the first 30 seconds. With 5:27 on the board, Shull made a turnaround shot. Bell stayed hot with 2 more threes in the next couple of minutes.

Shull stole the ball with 3:20 left for another basket and Curry added a three-pointer at 2:55. Larned managed a three-point shot and a two-pointer, but a jumper by Bell set the score at 50-11 at the end of the third.

Larned couldn't get any shots to fall in the fourth while the Lady Eagles added 4 more with a basket from Bell and 2 free throws from Shull and Strange. Colby triumphed with a final score of 54-11.

Bell dominated the floor, scoring a game-high 18 points on 7 of 14 field goals, including 4 three-pointers. She had 9 rebounds, an assist and a block.

Curry followed with 11 points, going 4 of 6 from the field including 3 three-point baskets, and stole Ortner finished with 8 points, 2 rebounds, an as-

sist and 4 steals; Kriss grabbed 7 points, 4 rebounds, an assist, a block and 3 steals; Shull chipped in 5 points, 5 rebounds and 2 steals; Strange contributed 3 points, 4 rebounds and 1 block; and Terrell made 2 free throws and grabbed 4 rebounds, an assist and

The girls scored 37 points off Larned turnovers, pulled down 44 rebounds and scored 21 points from three-point shots.

becoming more aggressive, and on defense. "We also improved on not allowing the other team control how we play," said Ritter.


