## Lady Bulldog squad wins championship

The Golden Plains Lady Bulldogs won the Class 1A Division II Substate Championship March 2 after defeating Weskan and Triplains-Brewster at the Colby Community Building for the right to play in the state tournament the following week

"Winning substate was definitely a highlight," said junior Kylie Jones. "This felt like the first time we had a challenge in quite a few weeks."

The Lady Bulldogs had been undefeated since the Castle Rock Tournament in early December and demonstrated their teamwork and skill throughout the substate competitions. They entered the tournament ranked No. 1 and received a bye for the quar-

The Wallace County Lady Wildcats defeated Wheatland-Grinnell advancing to face the Lady Bulldogs. These two teams had not yet met up this season and had to feel each other out during the first quarter. Once they got going, the Lady Bulldogs pulled ahead only to have the Lady Wildcats tie it up with three minutes remaining in the quarter. A basket from Kami Miller and a three-point shot from Jordan Christensen gave the Lady 'Dogs a 10-5 lead going

and played like they wanted the win as they pumped in 16 points to the Lady Wildcats' 5 to hold a 26-10 lead at half.

The Lady Wildcats tried hard in the second half, but the Lady 'Dogs worked well together and meant business as they came to win and continued to outscore their opponents 14-8 and 14-7 in the third and fourth quarters for the 54-25 win.

Scoring for the Lady Bulldogs were Christensen 15, Hailee Spresser 13, Kylie Jones 7, Angela Ritter 6, MiKayla Lobato 6, Miller 5 and Paulita Ramirez 2. Christensen also pulled down 17 rebounds and Spresser grabbed 16, giving them each a double-

Advancing to the championship game, the Lady Bulldogs played the Triplains-Brewster Lady Titans for the third time this season. They had defeated them easily in early January, but barely squeaked by them in mid-February. The Lady Bulldogs knew the Titans had improved throughout the season and they had to bring their "A" game to this tournament game.

The girls from Golden Plains did just that as they got the tip, but lost it to the Lady Titans for the first score. Once they retrieved the ball, they ran up a 12-2 lead before the Lady Titans added a final basket just before the first-quarter buzzer.

The girls kept working the ball to Spresser under the basket in the second as she quickly ran up 6 more points against the Lady Titans. Jones took over with additional points along with Ritter to hold a 26-12

The Lady Titans showed their determination and resilience in the second half, giving the lagging Lady Bulldogs a run for their money with both teams putting in 13 points in the third quarter.

The Lady 'Dogs regained their energy in the fourth and lit up their defense to hold the Lady Titans to 8 points while adding 14 points – 8 from free throws – in the final eight minutes to win the championship

"I am SOOO proud to be a Bulldog!" exclaimed The Lady Bulldogs took over in the second quarter senior Ritter. "I couldn't ask for a better group of girls, coaches and fans to share my senior year with!"

Jones shot 100 percent of her free throws, 7 of 7, to achieve a double-double with 15 points, 11 rebounds and 2 steals. Spresser also made 100 percent of her shots from the line for 14 points, 6 rebounds, 1 assist and 1 steal. Ritter put in 9 points, grabbed 4 rebounds and distributed 7 assists while Miller scored 7 points, 8 rebounds and 3 assists. Christensen totaled 8 points, 8 rebounds, 2 assists and 2 steals. Additional rebounds came to Juenemann 3, Rush 2, Lobato 1 and Tayler Petersen 1. Lobato also had 2

"Big thanks to our cheerleader Morgan Walz, amazing student section and supportive community," added Ritter.

Wes Welker's signing for \$12 million over two years highlighted another busy day for the Broncos on Wednesday.

In addition to bringing Welker on board, Denver also agreed to terms on a two-year deal with defensive tackle Terrance Knighton, formerly of Jacksonville, and a one-year contract with linebacker Stewart Bradley, who played with the Cardinals the past two seasons.

Broncos boss John Elway was far from done, though, adding cornerback Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie on a one-year deal later in the evening.

Once again, the Broncos are being aggressive in free agency.

Manning guided the Broncos to a 13-3 regular season finish, only to lose to Baltimore in double overtime during the division round of

Instead of sticking with the same cast, Elway is revamping the roster. Nothing too drastic, just adding some crucial pieces.

He picked up the league's most productive receiver to play in the slot where Brandon Stokley was last season. Welker's five 100-catch seasons are the most in the NFL. He has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his past five seasons and was an All-Pro four of the past five years.
