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## Coalition discusses Walk Kansas

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A plan to extend the deadline to register for Walk Kansas was discussed at the Thomas County Coalition meeting Thursday.

Thomas County Extension Agent Diann Gerstner said she is extending the registration deadline for the Walk Kansas challenge to 5 p.m. Wednesday because of spring break. The deadline was originally Sunday.

The challenge is for each person on a team of six to walk at least 150 minutes a week for eight weeks between Sunday and Saturday, May 11. People who complete the challenge will have walked a distance roughly equal to the 423 miles across the state from west to east, Gerstner said, rity. assuming they walk one mile in 15 minutes.

"If you can talk perfectly you're just not walking fast enough," she said.

Members of teams who completed the challenge will be eligible to win an elliptical machine or a treadmill at a drawing at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 15, at the 4-H building. The cost to participate is \$7, of which \$2 will go to the state and the rest will go to the Extension Office, which provides support services for the teams. In other business:


