# Sheriff asks for help to pay jailers overtime

- Approved a resolution to protect gun owners' rights. The resolution says that the state should not enforce unconstitutional laws that restrict peoples' Second Amendment rights, and asks that all elected officials up to the national level should restrict such laws.
- Decided to inspect county roads on Monday, April 15, and hold a township meeting on Tuesday, April 16, at the suggestion of Clair Schrock, county road supervisor.
- Discussed several issues with the courthouse. Steele pointed out that the keybox does not have a lock on it, and the custodian said several keys have gone missing. He said rust had been discovered in the pipes, which are made of iron and not copper.
- Discussed a \$2,000 risk avoidance grant the county got from the Kansas County Association Multi-Line Pool, its insurance carrier. Emergency Medical Services Director Joe Hickert wrote that

he wanted to use the money to help cover the cost of repairing a bumper for an ambulance that was damaged when it hit a deer.

- Talked about who would go to the Colby/Thomas Chamber of Commerce annual banquet at City Limits Convention Center on Saturday, April 27.

- Tabled a decision on proposed wage increases for numerous county employees.

- Looked at, but did not pass, a proclamation celebrating 45 years of fair housing in the county.

- Approved minutes for meetings from its March 18 meeting, and for the Fair Board and the Economic Development Alliance.

- Approved the accounts payable register, which came to \$187,656 and the payment warrant register, \$1,031.

- Approved payroll for March, \$261,605.

- Approved a \$29 line item transfer in the employee benefits budget.

- Approved changes to the county tax rolls for Shawn Pabst and Shelly and Jesse Vincent.

# Building going up near Levant

of their energy through doors and windows.

The building will house Holloway's workshop, offices and a showroom. He says he will build many of the doors and windows himself.

The premade wall panels are mounted to the cement foundation using nails and sealed to each other with caulking so that there are no leaks between panels, Thompson said. When

properly finished with windows and doors like Holloway's, he added, buildings like these can require an external air source because, unlike other types, not enough air naturally circulates through leaks.

The building's headers are built on-site, but the rest of the materials come pre-made. Thompson's company sent the building plans to Energy Panel Structures, which engineered the building to match their product. Energy Panel sent

the preliminary design back to Thompson and Holloway for last-minute changes before the panels were built. It takes only a few weeks to get the panels after the final design is submitted, said Thompson.

The buildings cost about the same as a typical insulated building, said Thompson, but typically pay for any extra costs in the form of energy savings within three years.

scientists. Sebelius said some girls as young as 11 are physically capable of bearing children but shouldn't be able to buy the pregnancy-preventing pill on their own. President Barack Obama said he supported the decision, also citing concern for young girls.

That move shocked women's groups - and in his ruling, Korman blasted Sebelius for what he called an "obviously political" decision.

"This case is not about the potential misuse of Plan B by 11-year-olds," Korman wrote, saying the number of young girls using such drugs "is likely to be minuscule."

Yet the sales restrictions are

making it hard for women of all ages to buy the pills, especially young and low-income ones, he said.

Moreover, Korman noted that numerous over-the-counter

drugs are dangerous for children, but are still sold nevertheless without age requirements, while "these emergency contraceptives would be among the safest drugs sold over-the-counter."
