Master gardeners to offer spring tips

Spring has sprung we hope - so the Thomas County master gardeners invite the public to informative horticulture sessions Tuesday at the Thomas County Office Complex.

At 5:30 p.m., Julie

Niehage, Golden Prairie Extension Agent will be giving tips and tricks for growing great tomatoes. At 6:15 p.m., Jim Strine, Northwest Area Extension Forester, will be doing a tree pruning and planting demonstration and talking about tree care. At 7:30 p.m., Julie will be speaking again, this time about the top 40 annuals. These varieties have been tested for our climate and are the best means to success.

A light meal will be provided, or feel free to bring your own brown bag. For information, contact the Thomas County Extension Office at 460-4582.

Speaking of horticulture, it's time to put down crabgrass preventer. That's another name for pre-emergence herbicides that prevent crabgrass seeds from developing into mature plants. They do not keep the seed from germinating but kill the young plant. Crabgrass preventers, with few exceptions, have no effect on existing crabgrass plants, so must be applied before germination. Additionally, preventers do not last forever once applied to the soil. Most, if applied too early, lose strength before they are needed.

Most crabgrass preventers are ineffective after 60 days, but there is considerable variation.

For most of Kansas, crabgrass begins to germinate around May 1; April 15 is a good target date for applying preventer because it has time to evenly disperse in the soil. For us in northwest Kansas, May 1 is best.

Since this year has been cooler than normal, germination will be later. For this reason it is better to base timing on the bloom of ornamental plants like the eastern redbud tree. plied as early as March 1. Because of the added flexibility in timing, these products are favorites of lawn care companies.

Though Dimension cannot be applied as early as Barricade, it is the best choice if it must be applied later than recommended. It can kill crabgrass as long as it is young (two- to three-leaf stage). Dimension is also the best choice to treat a lawn planted late last fall.

Normally a pre-emergence herbicide is not recommended unless the lawn has been mowed two to four times, but it is kind to young tall fescue, perennial ryegrass, and Kentucky bluegrass seedlings and can be applied as early as two weeks after germination. Lawns established in the fall can be safely treated with Dimension the following spring even if they have not been mowed.

Products containing Dimension and Barricade may use the common chemical names - for Dimension, dithiopyr, and for Barricade, prodiamine. Remember, read the label and follow instructions.

On another note, what a difference a year makes! Last year, many plants were in full bloom. This year, the only plant in full bloom on April 1 was winter honeysuckle.

Last year we were two to three weeks ahead of normal. Now we are behind.

Take forsythia, for example. An average date for full bloom has been about the third week in March. The earliest we have seen full bloom on forsythia since 2005 has been March 10, 2006, and the latest was April 5, 2008.

We are about two weeks behind normal and about a month behind last year. This does not mean we will stay two weeks behind. Below normal temperatures will cause plants to lag even further, while above normal temperatures may allow us to at least partially catch up. Regardless, it appears "normal" in Kansas is just an average of the extremes.


