# Bank's program pays off for schools, their students

Several area students and three principals got a little present April 23 with checks from Sunflower Bank, for the schools to use for any thing they need and the kids for making "A" grades.

The bank gave \$2,421 to the Colby School District, \$302 to Sacred Heart Catholic School and \$186 to Heartland Christian School in a short ceremony.

School officials accepted checks from Jim Stanley, president of the bank's Colby branch, part of \$3,821 Sunflower has given area schools and students this year as part of its ABC Program, in which the bank and its customers give money to selected schools and A students.

"As a community bank, we love being able to support our local schools and student," Stanley said. "School costs are increasing, and the budgets are decreasing. Fortunately, we have engaged customers that continue to step up and participate in the program allowing us to support our thriving communities."

High-performing students from those schools got checks from the bank the same day. Brenn Stanley (Jim's granddaughter), a kindergartener at Colby Grade School; Brandon Johnson, an eighth-grader at the middle school; Cassandra Zimmerman, a second-grader at Sacred Heart; Denece Berggreen, a sixth-grader at Heartland; and Tomi Miller, a Colby High senior, all accepted checks.

During March and February, customers at the bank could give five cents for every debit card transaction they made, and the bank offered new customers \$100 to join the program,

matching that with a \$100 donation to a participating school.

The kids were drawn at random from among students who brought their report card to the bank, Stanley said. They got \$10

of support from others in Colby.

"The number of people that have come to us, just in this last year is crazy," Chris Keen said.

Dogs in the park would have to have city and rabies tags and be voice-controlled, Emily Keen said.

The council was skeptical of the idea. Councilman Bill Mariman asked if there would be somebody at the park around the clock. When the Keens told him no, he asked how they would keep dogs out. They said that dog users would make up the members of the committee, so they would be able to report improperly-tagged dogs.

When McGreer asked City

Attorney John Gatz for his input, he was skeptical about turning over city property to a group of volunteers.

"I mean, you're not going to let me go in and mow Fike Park," he said.

He said that only the city should work on city property.

"You're not going to turn the Community Building over to a volunteer committee, you're not going to turn the swimming pool over to a volunteer committee, and if you follow my recommendation, you're not going to turn the park over," he said.

The Keens responded that the city did not offer them any help with the park when they came before the council Sept. 4 to propose setting up a park and to

ask for a place to put it.

McGreer told them that any work done on the park would have to have approval from the city, and Mayor Gary Adrian told them to come back with a definite proposal.

Chris Keen said Thursday he felt they got a better reception this time than in September.

"There's not a more perfect area for it in town." He said, pointing out that "They didn't deny the land."

He said the main improvement needed to set up the park would be a fence, and he is planning to look at the park to see how much it would cost. There would also have to be signs for dogs and a plastic bags and a dumpster for poop.

Later things like benches and human restrooms could be added, and the committee could keep raising money for improvements and maintenance.

time, sought information about group members' political activities, including their postings on social networking websites and about family members.

Certain tax-exempt charitable groups can conduct political activities but it cannot be their primary activity.

IRS Commissioner Douglas Shulman told Congress in March 2012 that the IRS was not target-

ing groups based on their political views.

"There's absolutely no targeting," Shulman told a House Ways and Means subcommittee.

Shulman was appointed by President George W. Bush.
