The Colby girls took second in both the 4x100 meter relay, with a time of 52.39 seconds, and the 4x400 relay, with a time of 4:18.10. They were fifth in the 4x800 relay with a time of 11:36.07.

They did especially well in shot put, with Kaylie Reeh first with a distance of 31-07.00 feet, and her teammate Victoria Rall second with a distance of 30-10.00. With a time of 12 minutes and 29.41 seconds, Andrea Browne took first in the 3200 meter run for the girls with a time of 12:29.41, and Hannah Strange was first in the girls high jump with a height of 5-00.00.
